Americans Paid in 1923 \$19.60 a Month in Rent

CHICAGO (AP). — Apartment house dwellers in the United States paid an average monthly rental of \$19.60 a month last year according to a report of the National Association of Building Owners and Managers. The report was based on a compilation of figures furnished by apartment house owners in the principal cities in the annual accounting and exchange report.

The highest rent recorded was \$23.31 a month for each room of an exclusive New York apartment. The average for New York was reported to be \$24.86. The New York figures, however, indicated the average cost of the most expensive apartments in the city.

Since the buildings reporting there were all of the higher grade, the owner of an Omaha nine-apartment building on the other hand, reported the lowest charge a room in the country. He listed his rooms at \$7.95 each a month. The income to owners ranged from 1.55 percent to 14.09 percent of the tax valuation, with a general average of 7.83 percent of the owner's valuation of the buildings. The taxes paid by apartment buildings averaged 16.32 percent of the gross income. The cost of fuel to heat the buildings and supply hot water averaged 5.27 percent of the gross income.
