

OLD ENGLISH CUSTOM ENDS

LONDON (AP).—Another age-old English custom of the Dorset countryside has passed, and the "Hundred Bell," which has tolled twice a day without break for centuries, will be heard no more. Handed down from the heart of the Thomas Hardy country, it is an ancient tradition, and one of the oldest customs was the daily ringing of a time bell in the church tower at one o'clock in the day and again in the evening.

The custom goes back to a period when clocks were unknown to the humble natives, who measured time by the sun's course or by the ringing of a public bell. A month ago a new rector came to the village. He had no objection to the ancient custom, but church funds are not what they used to be, and the bell ringer gets \$25 a year. The rector agreed that if the town wants to continue the practice, the cost should come out of public funds. The town council debated the question long and anxiously recently, and by a majority of one decided that Handed bell shall not ring tonight or any other night, if the taxpayer has to foot the bill.

Vikings Of Old Showed Great Navigating Skill

REYKJAVIK, Iceland (AP).—American naval officers who last month visited Iceland in connection with the globe-encircling flight of the American aviators, were greatly interested in the navigational methods of the old vikings who, more than 1,000 years ago, sailed their little vessels, without compasses or other instruments, across the storm-beaten north Atlantic to Iceland, Greenland and even the shores of North America.

Even today the charts of these waters are largely based on observations and soundings made by whalers and the early explorers, scores of years ago, and the few large vessels that today visit these seas proceed with the utmost caution. Sailing directions, the "Bible of the Sea," are carefully consulted, and when new soundings are made the results are sent to the different governments for incorporation in the charts. But when Lieut. Erickson and his other adventurous old Norsemen of more than ten centuries ago set out on their dangerous voyages there were no charts, and the stars were the only directional guides. The observations they made were for centuries the only sailing directions, and were charted in the form of sagas, as the sailors swept over the rough seas. Some of these sagas exist today, and old pilots at Reykjavik are familiar with the lore they contain.

One of them, describing the journey from Norway to Greenland not only takes account of the physical features to be watched for, but advises the navigators to keep a lookout for the birds and whales that mark the approaches to the Icelandic coast.

A naval officer who made a study of this route found it was almost a perfect recreation, or shortest sailing route, worked out without scientific aids by navigators who probably could neither read nor write.

Potato Will Be King at Fair.

PENDLETON, Ore.—The potato will be king in the third fair that Pendleton county has had this year when the annual triennial county Potato show is held Friday at Weston. Exhibits will be centered around the potatoes that have been made famous by the Weston bench land and have caused that district to be sought as the home of good seed, but other farm products will be shown. Wheat, barley, oats, corn, beans and canned fruits and vegetables will be exhibited.

CHURCHES ARE ASKED TO AID

ALBANY, (AP).—Appealing to the churches of the United States to exercise a greater and more constant influence upon the moral and religious work of penal institutions, Frank Moore, of Albany, N. J., president of the American Prison Association, today sent out a request that every minister in the land have prison work as a part of his duty.

In his message President Moore quoted statistics to show that crime in this country is increasing to an alarming degree. He pointed out that the census shows that from 1904 to 1922 this increase was at the rate of 50 per cent, and that every year approximately one out of 666 citizens of the country grows the New Year in prison. "If men in prisons are going to be free from sin and from the fetters that bind them," Mr. Moore said, "the churches must take an interest in the prison problem of the country. It is not a question of punishment but of reformation that must be worked out in the prisons."

"There are many men in charge of the prisons of the country who are anxious to do moral work with their charges, but are not able because they do not have men and women who would be willing to work with them in reaching the individual offender. The head of a

penal institution with hundreds, and it may be thousands, under him, has no money, either that personal work with each individual is a physical impossibility. The church could be of valuable help to him if it would only offer its assistance.
