BOISE SQUAD PLAYS BAKER

Gem State Team Left for Queen City at 8:30 O'clock This Morning in Auto Stage.

BOISE, Ida. (Special)—Seventeen Boise gridiron aspirants left this morning at 8:30 o'clock for Baker, Ore., where they will play Baker high school Saturday afternoon. The Braves have played two games on their home field so far this season, winning both to large scores and making a total of 23 first downs compared to 19 for their opponents. "We do not expect any serious proposition at Baker or expect to be there as long as we did last year," said Coach C. W. Haines, Braves' captain, Thursday night, "however we expect to bring home the laurels."

Thursday afternoon the first game was played through a fog and the practice did not develop. During the last week the tackling dummy was put to considerable use to improve the defense. All regular first string men are back in uniform and the regular line up probably will start the game Saturday, the eighth and last of the Baker gridiron but they will probably put up more opposition than any team so far encountered. Last year the Baker squad was practically green, but this year's makeshift warriors have all had at least one year of experience.

Few Serious Injuries. So far this season the Braves have been lucky in that they have suffered no serious injuries. Firpo Balks at Tilts With Romero, Godfrey

NEW YORK. (AP)—Luis Firpo has balked at efforts of Tex Rickard to sign him for a match with Quintin Romero, the Cuban heavyweight, or George Godfrey, Philadelphia negro fighter.

The promoter wants to put on Firpo with either of these men at Madison Square Garden the first week of December, but so far the Argentine, still involved in legal complications growing out of deportation proceedings against him, has declined to sign articles. Firpo indicated he still harbored resentment against Romero for the latter's alleged "overstaying" remarks last spring when Luis refused to meet the "Chickie" in South America. Firpo told Rickard's matchmaker he was disinclined to fight Romero on this account.

BOND ISSUE AUTHORIZED

OREGON CITY, Ore. — By a vote of 440 to 302 Oregon City residents in a special election authorized a bond issue of \$22,000 for the construction of a municipal building on Main street. At a previous election \$25,000 was provided for a new city hall, and the two new buildings will now be erected.

Other games on the coast tomorrow are: S. C. vs. Washington at Seattle; Washington vs. Oregon at Eugene; Washington State vs. California at Berkeley; U. S. vs. Nevada and Montana vs. Montana School at Mines.

Urges New Law on Spotlights Used on Autos

FALEM, Ore. (Special) — A Falem chief state traffic inspector is working on proposed legislation to go before the next legislature to remedy the spotlight evil that is now something of a nuisance on the main traveled routes in Oregon.

The law at present does not require spotlights to be placed at any particular place on the car and does not require any particular pattern of light. Rarely does a law requiring the light on the left

side of the car, but says there is considerable opposition to this and some reasonably good arguments against it. The law favors a lamp that will throw a certain pattern of rays into the road.

For automobiles that are not equipped with dividers the law requires the headlights to be extinguished and the spotlight used instead, although it is required that the spotlight be set in such a way as not to throw its rays into the eyes of motorists coming in the opposite direction. With some pattern of light, however, it is found that the spotlight is sometimes so aimed to an oncoming driver's eyes that he is set.

"Our records show that all of our traffic officers are approving that for conditions of the law relating to lights," said Rattery, "we give ourselves by 'hard sense' in making a decision and try not to adopt a policy. There are often circumstances that appear to be beyond the control of the ordinance maker. In the case of a car without a divider, the car usually records show that the driver is maneuvering constantly for the convenience of all phases of the traffic laws."
