CATTLE ROUND
UP CONTINUES

Stock Taken From Lower
Powwaka Where Feed
Was Below Expectations.

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special).—George Cousins returned home the latter part of the week from Lower Powwaka, where he went to take up the stock of the stock association. He reported that the stock was below expectations. A part of the cattle were found and brought out Saturday. The stock have not done well in this section of the range this summer. Many of them had drifted into the deep canyons and had stayed along the water out canyons in the season. The young stock, which were more inclined to climb the steep slopes to better feed were in much better condition than the cows and calves, many of which were very poor. No border has been kept with the stock, and they were badly scattered, only a part of them being located on the first ride. The men have returned again this week in an effort to

gather the balance of them. Those bringing out stock the last of the week included Gastin & Cousins, E. A. McRae and Earl Shorod. T. G. Johnson finished digging his potato crop a few days ago. He had seven acres of irrigated land planted, but received a light turn out, getting only 125 sacks of marketable potatoes from the tract. Reports from all parts of the county indicate that the potato crop is much below normal.

G. P. Reed and son Elwyn went to Joseph the first of the week where they expect to spend a few days deer hunting. The deer are said to be quite plentiful in that section of the country.

P. A. Downing and family and Mrs. E. A. Downing motored to La Grande the last of the week. The severity of stockwater is said to be great in many parts of the county. The continued dry weather has caused many of the springs and wells to play out, which have not failed in years. Many farmers in the hill sections have found it necessary to haul water from the valley, for watering stock, which cannot be handled by the water.

T. G. Johnson moved his large bunch of hogs to the T. H. Vain, hard ranch in the hills north of town recently, where he expects to herd them on several hundred acres of wheat stubble. He states the hogs are making a rapid gain, as the feed is plentiful. The grain was very short, and when harvested with a binder much of the short heads fell on the ground and could not be saved.

A number of people over the county have been suffering from severe colds and sore throats during the past couple of weeks.

J. B. Plasa has been busy the past several days doing some fall plowing on his farm in the valley southeast of town. The ground is very dry requiring lots of horse power. Many of the farmers have been hoping early fall rain would wet the ground sufficiently to make plowing good but from present prospects, it appears that but very little fall plowing will be done in this section, unless the late fall and early winter is very open.

Wheat Growing. Practically all fields of fall sown wheat have made a very slow growth, much of the grain has not germinated due to the lack of moisture, giving the fields a very spotted appearance. A few farmers are yet doing some seedling. A considerable number of the farmers used the dry treatment this fall instead of straw, some stating that wheat treated in this way appears to be making a more vigorous growth when once started, than the wheat which was strawed.

Mrs. Earl Shorod has been a patient at the hospital here for the past week. She is reported to be improving at this time. Howard McLean of Bendleton was among the Wallowa visitors the early part of the week. John Couch and wife left Wednesday for outside points. They were called by the serious illness of one of Mr. Couch's brothers. Word was received by the folks at home Thursday evening, that the sick man's condition was showing improvement.

Roy Gastin has been busy the past week pulling up the frame of his machine. He expects to have the machine completed in a short time if weather continues to remain favorable. H. O. Anderson is able to be out again, after being sick for the past week.

C. E. Harmon of Leap has been quite successful in trapping some skunks which have been killing his poultry. Eugene Lathrop and Mr. Hensley spent a couple of days the last of the week in the north woods hunting for deer. They report an abundance of signs, but did not see any of the game. All underbrush in the woods is extremely dry, making it very difficult to hunt game without much noise being made by traveling through the brush. A considerable number of hunters have been lucky enough to get some fine bucks during the past few weeks. The deer are said to be unusually plentiful in many places in the country this season.

WILLIAMS SEES
VICTORY SURE
FOR COOLIDGE

PORTLAND, Ore. (Special).—Coolidge and Hawes are going to be elected president and vice-president by a large majority, declares Ralph E. Williams, chairman of the Republican national committee. "And they are going to be elected by the people through the electoral college, don't let that slip from your mind," continued the G. O. P. leader. "Congressmen who are sitting around rubbing their hands and telling friends that the house of representatives will name the next president had better be looking out after the old home fences. Congress will make laws and not presidents."

Williams had just received a long telegram from William M. Barker, chairman of the national committee. Both are happy in claims when the tide is ebbing at high water. The local leader waved the flag cheerfully.

Fast Solidity for Coolidge. "Butler just writes that after a most careful canvass he is sure Coolidge will carry the east and the middle west without any doubt," continued Williams. "Some of the states that were closed as doubtful are showing a decided swing towards the Republican candidates, and now that swing has started there is nothing to stop it. We have been sure of the east all along but there was some doubt in some folks' minds about the middle west after a radical ticket got into the field. But Butler says that everything looks very favorable in those former doubtful states."

And the vice chairman is as sure of Oregon as he is that Washington won the world's series. "There is no question in my mind but that Coolidge will carry Oregon by a handsome majority," he said. "How handsome?" "Oh, by at least 25,000 or 30,000—let's say 25,000 to be conservative."

"How about our neighbors?" "In my opinion, Washington and California will both give their electoral votes to Coolidge and Hawes. And I am equally sure that the entire Republican congressional and state tickets in that commonwealth will be elected. A real fight is being put up, but we have them on the run now."

State Ticket to Carry. As for Oregon, Ralph Williams is sure of Crumpacker, Sinnott and Hawley being elected to congress. He says "Crumpacker will sweep this district by from 5,000 to 10,000."

"We will carry our entire state ticket. Senator McNary will be returned in a very big majority," said the national representative. "What about the state treasury?" "Tom Kay, without a struggle, I think he will carry the state by almost as large a vote as President Coolidge. I put Kay's majority at 25,000."

VOLGA WATERS
FULL OF RUIN

ASTRAKHAN, Russia (AP).—Life on the far-famed Volga river is slowly ebbing out. The great 2,300-mile yellow stream, once Russia's greatest commercial highway, no longer courses its winding way to the sound of fishermen's songs, the churning of the wheels of great excursion steamers, or the echoing sirens of heavily laden cargo boats. The hundreds of villages which drew their life from the river are melancholy, spiritless places, for the people not only are faced with a wheat famine this year, but their fishing business, which is their chief support, is all but dead.

Where in pre-war days the Volga produced two billion pounds of fish and caviar annually, it now yields only one-tenth that quantity. This is no fault of the river, but of the government to exploit it properly. The government at first nationalized the fisheries and, finding that a failure, it restored the fishery enterprises to their original owners, but the owners have found the government taxes too onerous and many of them have abandoned their business altogether. Only 70 of the 380 fisheries which formerly operated at Astrakhan, the great caviar depot, have remained active.

But it is in the striking decrease in the number of excursion and cargo steamers that one notices the most significant change in the Volga. Where previously the river was covered with thousands of commercial and pleasure craft, it now carries only occasional passenger steamers and small cargo boats. In every bend and inlet in the river the visitor sees scores of abandoned excursion steamers slowly sinking to the bottom.

The few passenger vessels still on the river are well equipped, entirely by Russians of the proletarian class, for there are few but they are patronized almost exclusively by Russians, and members of the old intellectual regiment have no money to make such trips.

One of the most pathetic scenes along the whole course of the river are the forests of abandoned fishing boats, whose slender masts, pointed toward the sky like huge fingers, seem to be calling to heaven to witness the death of their ancient and respected industry. Their owners have turned to more lucrative callings.

In the absence of fishermen, one sees groups of soldiers and longshoremen, who invariably complain of bad times and low wages. Work is difficult to obtain, and the longshoremen therefore are willing to discharge huge cargoes from vessels at the ridiculous rate of a cent for every hundred pounds.

Nature also seems bent on completing the economic doom of the historic river, for everywhere huge beds of moving sand are gathering, which block the river and impede navigation. The sand dredges are neither numerous nor sufficiently efficient to remove all these impediments to river traffic.
