Mrs. H. G. Black and daughter Evelyn are spending a few days in La Grande.

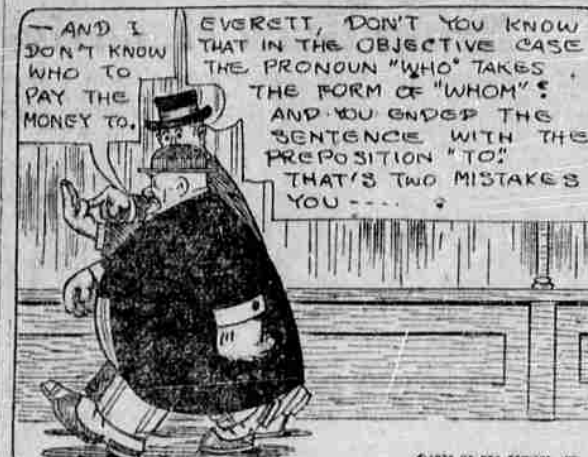

John B. For judgment and decree of the Court against the defendants Ed-ward W. Birchfield and Bertha Birchfield, his wife, and each of them both jointly and severally, for the sum of \$500.00, together with interest thereon at the rate of 8 per cent per annum from and after the 10th day of December, 1922; for the further sum of \$40.00, together with interest thereon at the rate of 10 per cent per annum from and after the 10th day of December, 1922; and for the fur-ther sum of \$72.00 as a reasonable attorney's fee herein and for plaintiff's costs and disbursements in-curred in this suit.

That the sums of money above set forth be decreed to be a good, valid and subsisting lien upon the premises described as follows, to-wit:

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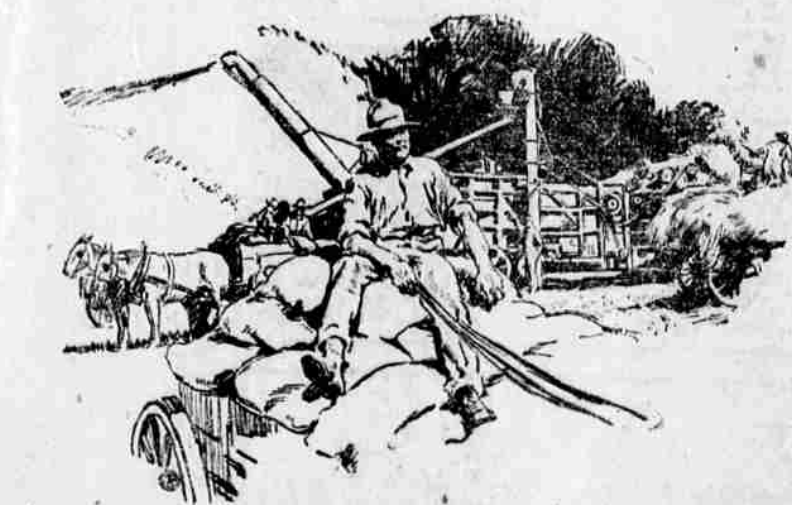
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
