ST. PAUL WINS OPENING TILT

SEATTLE (AP)—The St. Paul baseball club, champions of the American association, defeated the Seattle club, winners of the 1924 pennant of the Pacific Coast league, in a one-sided game here Sunday afternoon by the score of 17 to 4.

The Indians put across a run in the first inning. St. Paul tying the score in the third. In the fourth the fighting, peppery, hard hitting Indians scored three runs and practically clinched the victory, adding another run in the fifth, four in the sixth one in the seventh and two in the eighth.

FOUR TEAMS LEFT IN RACE

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Four teams in the coast football conference lead this week as the leading contenders for the championship. They are University of Southern California, the University of Washington, Stanford University and the University of California.

The three conference games Saturday virtually eliminated several competitors.

The University of Idaho, which had bowled over the University of Montana and Washington State college, and was headed straight for the title, had a heart-breaking tilt to Stanford at Portland. Idaho outplayed Stanford, but yielded the game by three points, when Cuddihy, a Cardinal halfback, kicked goal from placement. Thus Stanford remains in the race and Idaho must withdraw its hope for another year.

California, playing its first conference game, routed Washington State neatly and decisively, 29 to 7, in the Berkeley stadium. Washington had run up colossal scores until Saturday when it barely won over the Oregon Aggies, 6 to 3, at Seattle. The Huskies did not look so formidable but the soggy field may have had something to do with it.

The Aggies, too, are extremely heavy this season.

Routinely California defeated the University of Nevada, 21 to 7, in a non-conference game and the University of Oregon beat Whitman 49 to 6, in a northwest conference game.

Passenger Flights in Europe Show Very Few Accidents

LONDON (AP)—Only six deaths have been recorded in the last five years of English commercial aviation. More than 50,000 passengers were carried during that time, and about 4,000,000 miles flown.

The English commercial air services have had a remarkable growth, starting with a total of 26 passengers in 1919 and steadily increasing. Most of the passenger service was done between London and Paris, where six trips are now made daily. The routes to Berlin, Moscow and Cologne are now being operated daily and carry on the average of two passengers. The freight capacity of the planes is usually taken several days in advance.

The Imperial Airways, the national syndicate, is preparing to add 2,000 miles daily service to the 1,600 miles it now operates. The new routes include Zurich-Rome and Paris-Madrid.
