WIRE SERVICE
CHECKS CLOCK

In conformance with its policy of keeping up with the times in all departments of the trade the firm of J. H. Pearce and Son, jewelers, has installed a direct wire service from the Mount Wilson observatory at San Francisco which insures absolutely accurate time.

Three minutes before the hour of 12, noon, each day the telegraph receiver which has been set up in the window of the store sets a warning signal and then again on the hour the top, tip of the instrument accurately checks the time with the large mercury clock on the wall.

The new service was used for the first time Saturday and the clock was found to be correct to the second but will be checked on each day from now on. The equipment gives J. H. Pearce and Son an opportunity to check the O-W, R. & N. watches which are left in their care to the fraction of a second.

By "orderly marketing" is meant the forming of an agreement between cattlemen whereby shipments can be regulated in such a way as to prevent the recurrence of the most recent experiences which have cost the producers so heavily in the Portland markets. This committee has secured the endorsements of 172 stockmen in Oregon and Idaho.

Disruptive Forces at Work.

"We are at work to disrupt everything," the Socialist-third party nominee for president, has made his appeal to the voters of the Mississippi valley. He has asked them to throw into the discard the constitution, the very protector of the welfare of the people. The people's welfare means their prosperity. He has advocated government ownership of railroads and other dangerous industries. Now he has gone east, once more to plead these theories to industrial workers.
