FAMOUS COACH DIES SUDDENLY

Percy Haughton, Old-Time Harvard Mentor, Succumbs to Acute Indigestion.

NEW YORK (AP)—Percy D. Haughton, head football coach at Columbia university, founder of the famous "Haughton system" at Harvard and generally regarded as one of the foremost exponents of the gridiron sport, died Monday afternoon at St. Luke's hospital at 6 o'clock, one hour after he was stricken with acute indigestion at Baker Field while directing the work of his team.

His sudden death came two days after the Columbia eleven had administered a crushing defeat to Williams college, which was taken as proof by critics that Haughton had installed a football system at Columbia destined to rival his former success at Harvard where his teams from 1903 to 1916 ranked with the best in gridiron history.

The fatal attack interrupted the first practice which was to prepare his squad for its road trip next Saturday at Rhine, Tenn. Cornell, Army and Dartmouth were also on the most ambitious schedule which Columbia had attempted since football had been revived at Columbia in 1916. Haughton came to Columbia in April, 1923, taking charge of the spring training of that season. His contract said to have been for \$15,000 a year, thought to be a record price for a football coach. Prior to his advent at Columbia the football teams had been mediocre.

Built Great System.
Haughton's reputation as a football coach was established at Harvard when he took charge of another "grid" football situation in 1903 and built up the most remarkable system known to the game up to that period. From the time that his teaching took hold until 1916 when he left the Harvard eleven were among the most formidable in the east. His 1914 and 1915 teams administered to Yale and the most crushing defeats ever received at the hands of her Cambridge rival.

Haughton coached teams were famous for their mastery of the intricate details of the game. The modern scouting system which has been so generally adopted as to become an accepted phase of the sport was first introduced on a broad scale by Haughton.

When he left Harvard in 1916 to become president of the Boston National baseball club, he was generally regarded as the most successful football coach of the decade. He resigned the presidency of the Braves in 1918 to enter the army as a major in the chemical corps. After the war he became associated with banking interests in Boston where his home is. There were still maintained at the time of his death as Haughton spent

only the spring and fall with the Columbia team.

Haughton was a football end and captain of the 1899 baseball nine at Harvard. He was also head coach at Cornell university for two years.

TELEPHONE DIRECTORY BREAKS SIZE RECORDS

The new directory for Greater New York, which has recently been published by the New York Telephone company, is the largest telephone directory ever issued. It weighs nearly five pounds and is made up of 1926 pages. The directory contains 520,000 telephone numbers, an increase of 45,000

over the preceding issue and 112,000 greater than a year ago. Owing to the removal of subscribers from one district to another and the addition of nine new central office districts a total of 520,000 changes and additions in listings was made. There are now 141 central offices in Greater New York. At the end of 1922 there were 111.

Greatest Work on English Soon to Come from Press
