Scattered Lepers Endanger Public Health in Philippines

MANTILA (AP).—More than 200 lepers detained in various parts of the Philippines are held under conditions neither sanitary, humane nor safe to the public at large, according to an urgent communication sent by Visayas governor Evaristo A. Gilmore to the secretary of commerce and communications. Mr. Gilmore requests that a coastguard vessel be made available immediately for the purpose of collecting these lepers from the various islands and transporting them to Cebu Island, the leper colony.

According to the report of Dr. Jose Arellano, chief of the Cebu leper colony, 5,162 persons are confined there, four of whom are Americans. The colony consists of 2,487 men, 1,341 women, 892 boys, and 486 girls. There are 1,134 single and 2,336 married lepers; 267 widows and 1,298 children.

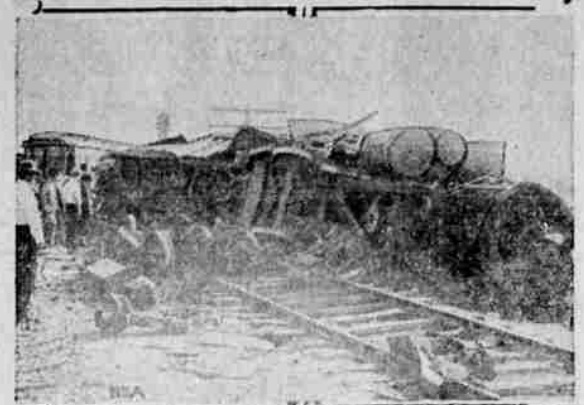

MANY ATTEND AUCTION SALE

WALLA WOLA, Ore. (Special).—A fairly large crowd attended the auction sale at the steamship place here Saturday afternoon. Only a small amount of stock remained to be sold, some having been disposed of at private sales. The greater part of the things sold at this sale brought fair prices.

He will use eight gang plows and expects to plow five hundred acres of land which he will seed to Federation wheat in the spring.

This section of the country was last by a light shower of rain the last of the week. The weather is again very cloudy with occasional showers. Moisture is greatly welcomed by everyone. The stock water in many parts of the county is very low, many farmers are hauling water, and driving their stock to water, who have not been short of water in many years.

The work of surfacing the stretch of road between here and the end of the Powawaka market road on Whiskey creek, is progressing quite rapidly. Two trucks and three four-horse teams are engaged in hauling the crushed rock from the crusher on the Mumford farm.
