board. Party unity was torn to shreds. It was no longer a convention of Democrats, not to pick a Democrat for president. It was a convention of Klan and anti-Klan adherents.

When the fever had run its course and the assemblage finally got down to the selection of a candidate, all the enthusiasm and vigor that should have been saved for the campaign had been dissipated. Neither side had won a victory. Neither side was satisfied. And neither side cared two whoops whether the candidate, they had finally nominated won or not.

To this situation, directly, can be attributed the rough and rocky road of the Davis managers in making progress with his campaign. From an open road and a cloudless sky the situation changed almost overnight to an almost impassable path overhung with clouds and threats of storm.

White resentment against Underwood, as the man who dragged in the Klan issue and directly precipitated the following fight, is perhaps keener, scarcely less keen is the feeling against others of the "favorite-son" group of candidates who, in the hope of a lucky break in their favor, refused to release their delegates and thus contributed to the long-drawn deadlock and its growing animosities.

Just what would have happened at any particular time, had any one or two of these candidates withdrawn, no one can start the dissolution of the deadlock, is a favorite subject for speculation around Democratic headquarters.

Everything might have been so different.

But it didn't happen—and from present confidence the party leaders have now descended to the stage of hope without expectation.

LOCAL MARINE TREADS DECKS

WASHINGTON. (Special)—How it feels to tread the deck of a battleship, afloat on the Pacific, is rapidly becoming a familiar sensation to Lawrence Eugene Butcher, formerly of La Grande, Oregon, who is now a member of the U. S. Marine guard on the dreadnaught California. His name appears on the official list of Marines assigned to that vessel, recently received at Marine Corps headquarters.

Although the Marines serve at many shore stations in the United States and in our possessions abroad, many of them prefer duty on battleships and cruisers, where they may have an opportunity to travel from port to port and occasionally come ashore for recreation and sightseeing.

Lawrence, who is a son of Mrs. Sarah Butcher, 1567 Y avenue, La Grande, joined the Marine Corps at Walla Walla, Washington, several months ago, and later was assigned to duty on the California. The California was recently reported at San Pedro, Calif., but will probably leave soon for other ports.
