The force of Americans arms is never pledged for the fulfillment of foreign loans or agreements.

Taking cognizance of Mr. Davis' attack upon Republican foreign policy, Secretary Hughes asked what the Democratic party proposed in regard to the league of nations.

It is constantly apparent that the center of attack by the Democrats with respect to foreign relations is that this country has not joined the league of nations.

What does the Democratic party propose?
"Who is the question arose in the Democratic convention the Democratic party can't cover."

Raps Bourgeois Plan.
Attacking the Democratic platform declaration in favor of a national referendum on American entry into the league and in the impassioned attack upon that plank in his national convention by Newton D. Baker, formerly Democratic secretary of war, Secretary Hughes cited Mr. Baker's assertion that the proposed referendum would be "fanciful, illogical and unconstitutional" and asked:

"Has Mr. Davis tried to prove it was anything else?
"Our policy," he continued, "is that of cooperation without injurious commitments. It is a policy of independence, not of isolation. We propose to co-operate to promote the interests of peace."

"We propose at the same time that this country shall not be embroiled in the conflicts of European political interests. Our just influence proper by our detachment from such conflicts."

President Coolidge, Secretary Hughes said, "is a leader who represents the common sense of America."
"He represents the wisdom gained by experience, that maintains the constitutional guarantee of individual liberty; that seeks better conditions of living and enhanced prosperity, not by futile promises or through illusions of dangerous agitation, but by the means which assure stability and continued confidence, while appropriate reforms are devised."

"The best assurance of prosperity in this country is to secure on November 1 the election of Calvin Coolidge."

Secretary Hughes was scheduled to leave Chicago for Buffalo where he plans to speak Wednesday night.

MAGAZINES IN FIELD CHANGE

True Story Type Best Sellers Today While "Deeper" Publications Show Slump.

The passing years bring changes in the style of magazines as well as in other accessories of modern life. No longer do the literary fables in the hands of the "first families" in the land display the current issue of Leslie's Weekly plumed with Century Magazine with several copies of the Sick Carter Magazine are carefully hidden out of sight beneath the color plates.
No, indeed, Leslie's Magazine is now defunct and the Century Magazine while still being published has had its popularity of the "eighties" usurped by a periodical whose covers brazenly label the contents as "true." If one is to judge by the number of them sold at the La Grande newsstands, the present demand for the so-called true story magazine is a comparatively recent development in the magazine field and many publishers are now appearing with magazines of this type which invariably prove the best sellers.
These magazines are read largely by women, according to the local news dealers, although some men are regular customers. The men of the present generation do more on the adventure stories than ever before. Whether this tendency results from the increasing number of men who are employed at desk jobs would be hard to say.
At the other end of the scale are local news markets, meaning the least number sold each month or week as the case may be, one finds the scientific and specialized magazines and the humorous publications.
The news clerks explain this situation in regard to the scientific magazines by the fact that most readers of these publications are regular subscribers and take an interest in reading an issue.
Up until comparatively recently the moving picture magazines were the best sellers but the number of ardent picture fans seems to have decreased of late years until the magazines are not selling so well as formerly.

GEORGIA BODY AGAINST DAVIS

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—Officials directing the presidential campaign in behalf of Davis and Bryan Tuesday were considerably excited by what appeared to be an organizer movement of the Ku Klux Klan to lead the vote away from the Democratic party nominees. The Atlanta Constitution says in a story that will appear in its issue this morning.
"It has been rumored for some time," the Constitution's story says, "that Davis had been sent to Klan leaders of various counties to 'out' the Democratic presidential nominees and that is some basis for the report appears to be substantiated by receipt this week of clippings from last Saturday's Searchlight official organ of the Ku Klux Klan, being sent from all parts of the state, indicating that the paper has been broadcast on the eve of the election with a view of injuring the Democratic nominees."
"This issue of the paper contains conspicuously on the front page a heavy headed article charging that in a recent address at Indianapolis John M. Davis in appealing to the negro vote of that state declared for 'complete equality regardless of race or creed.'"
"The Searchlight makes prominent display of the action of the J. B. Donahoe Klan of Birmingham, which denounced the above alleged utterance."

They are Senators Shields, Tennessee, and Dial, South Carolina, Democrats; and Hall of Delaware, McCormick of Illinois, and Sterling of South Dakota, Republicans. In Georgia Senator Phillips, Republican, seeking reelection, is opposed by Senator Adams, Democrat, who, instead of seeking reelection for the unexpired term that he has been serving has come out against Phillips for the full six year term.
Senator Walsh of Massachusetts is opposed by Speaker Gillett, who is retiring from the house next March.
Among leaders in the senate who are opposed for reelection are Senators Walsh of Montana and Simmons of North Carolina.
Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, the Republican leader, is not up for reelection, having four years of his term remaining, while Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, stands up for reelection, is unopposed.
Senators La Follette, Republican, and Wheeler, Democrat, of Wisconsin and Montana, respectively, also have several years of their terms remaining.
Two senators, Owen, Democrat, Oklahoma, and Ekins, Republican, West Virginia, are not seeking reelection.
Besides the regular 32 senatorial vacancies several states will hold elections to choose senators to fill unexpired terms.
In the house 385 members are seeking to retain their seats. Of this number 194 are Republicans, 185 Democrats, one Farm-Labor, one Independent and one Socialist.
Republicans defeated for reelection in primary elections are: Massachusetts: Paine, Massachusetts; Winlow, Massachusetts; Bullinger, Massachusetts; Anderson, Minnesota; Larson, Minnesota; Schall, Minnesota; Ward, New York; Snyder, New York; Young, North Dakota; Cable, Ohio; Fleetwood, Vermont; Rosenboom, West Virginia; and Reed, West Virginia.
Democrats not candidates for reelection are: West Virginia: Morris, Kentucky; Humphrey, Mississippi; Jost, Missouri; O'Brien, New Jersey; Stogie, New York; Ward, North Carolina; Howard, Oklahoma; Dyrnes, South Carolina; Salmon, Tennessee; and Hooker, Virginia.
