Water Cases Are Decided

BOHEM, Idaho. — Decision in a group of consolidated suits, filed by United States district court in 1920, 1921 and 1922, to foreclose water contracts on the Salmon project, near Twin Falls, was received last week at the office of the clerk of federal court from Judge F. S. Dietrich, at Donnelly, in which the court holds that the principal sum now due the plaintiffs upon each contract is \$24.04, as against the original contract price of \$40 an acre. Interest at the rate of 3 per cent from April 1, 1912, is allowed.

Beauty Hints

CASSEROLE OF LAMB WITH VEGETABLES

Oven dishes are becoming more popular because the appearance of the food is more appetizing than that prepared on top of the stove. And experienced housewives who are using self-heating enameled ware roasters, realize that this utensil is best adapted to meat dishes where basting plays such an important part in the flavor and breaking of the roast. And after the meat is cooked, enameled ware is most easily cleaned, no matter how thick the gravy.

A wholesome baked dinner consisting of meat and vegetables can be prepared in a self-heating enameled ware roaster, which saves considerable time. All the real work is in the preparation—the cooking only requires an oven of the proper temperature and timing.

Take two pounds of lamb shoulder, or round chops with a damp cloth, trim, sprinkle with salt and pepper and flour and brown quickly in a hot, greased frying pan. Place in a self-heating roaster and add two cupsful of diced carrots and a dozen small white onions, add two cupsful of water to the fat in the frying pan; let boil up once and then pour over the meat, adding

more water if necessary, just to cover the chops. Cover the roaster and bake in a moderate oven for one hour. Then add one teaspoonful of salt, six small potatoes cut in halves, and two cupsful of canned peas. Cover closely again and continue basting one hour longer. Thicken the gravy slightly before serving.
