Two for Treasurer

Jefferson Myers, Gov. Pierce's appointee to the office of state treasurer, will be opposed by Thomas E. Kay, of Marion county (Republican), and this presents to be one of the hottest of the state races. Campaigning by both parties has been decidedly heated.

W. P. Adams, Progressive, of Multnomah county; I. H. VanWinkle, Republican incumbent, of Marion county; and Oscar Furness, Democrat, of Multnomah county, are in the ring for attorney generalship.

U. H. Corey, Republican incumbent, of Baker county, is opposed by James Johns, Sec. of Unadilla county for the office of commissioner of the public service commission of Oregon representing the eastern Oregon district.

Charles Hilven, of Wallawa county, Democrat, will oppose Bruce Dennis, Republican incumbent, of La Grande, for state senator representing Union and Wallawa counties.

Three Opposed

J. D. Mickle, of Washington county, for dairy and food commissioner; Charles A. Hunter, of Wallawa county, state representative, and Albert R. Hunter, Union county state representative, are all opposed by any candidate for election.

Four for Senatorship

Charles McNary, Republican United State Senator, from Marion county, is favored to be re-elected. P. E. Coulter, Multnomah county Progressive; Milton A. Miller, Multnomah county Democrat, and R. Robinson, Clatsop county Socialist-Laborer, are seeking to dislodge Senator McNary.

Representative N. J. Sinnott, of Wasco county, Republican, also has a fight on his hands to retain his seat in congress. James Harvey Graham, Democrat of Baker county, is after his position.

Presidential Electors

Four sets of presidential electors appear on the sample ballot, one for Douglas and Powers, one for Davis and Bryan, one for La Follette and Wheeler and one for Johns and Reynolds.

Several Measures Up

The proposed bonus amendment, the public use and welfare amendment, the voters literacy amendment, the oleo-margarine and condensed milk bill referendum, the anti-trust bill, the proposed income tax bill, and the proposed workmen's compensatory compensation law for hazardous occupations are all on the ballot, with indications that the income tax appeal, the compensation bill and the oleo bill will receive the most attention.

side the election should it become necessary. In the balloting for president in the House, each state is entitled to one vote, this vote to be cast according to the will of the majority of representatives of each state.

Should all state delegations follow party lines, the division in the House would be as follows:

- Five states, Maryland, Montana, Nebraska, New Hampshire and New Jersey, have equally divided delegations. Republican states, not including Wisconsin, whose delegation is undecided to favor the cause of the Independent ticket, would be California, Colorado, Connecticut, Idaho, Maine, Michigan, Minnesota, Oregon, South Dakota, Vermont, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Massachusetts, North Dakota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Utah, Wisconsin, Wyoming. Democratic delegations are Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, South Carolina, Mississippi, Missouri, Nevada, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas, West Virginia and Virginia.

The fight for the United States senate seat vacated by the death of the late Le B. R. Colt has been between Jesse H. Metcalf, Republican, Governor William S. Flynn, Democratic mayor of Cranston, Independent. Contests for congressional seats follow former lines.

New Hampshire

U. S. Senator Henry W. Keyes, Republican, is a candidate for reelection in New Hampshire, being opposed by State Treasurer George E. Farrand, Democrat, Congressman William N. Rogers, Democrat, and Edward H. Watson, Republican, also seek reelection. Governor Fred H. Brown, Democrat, is the first New Hampshire governor to run for a second term in many years. His Republican opponent is John G. Winant, Governor Brown was elected two years ago by a plurality of 8,624. The state usually has gone Republican, but Winson carried it in both his campaigns for President, although by a margin of only 56 votes the second time. Harding carried the state by more than 22,000 in 1920.

Vermont

No U. S. Senator is to be elected in Vermont this year, Congressman Ernest W. Gibson, Republican, is a candidate for reelection in the second district and Elbert S. Brigham is the Republican nominee in the first district. In Vermont the Republican nomination for Governor, U. S. Senator and Congressman always has been equivalent to an election. Because of the fact that President Coolidge was born in Vermont an unusually large vote is expected November 4. Franklin S. Billings is the Republican nominee for Governor. The Democratic primary nominee, Howard E. Shaw, died on September 28.

Maine

State officers, Senator and Congressmen were elected in Maine in September. No state matters will come before the voters at the national election.

Rhode Island

The legislative controversy in which Rhode Island has been involved for the past year in playing a large part in the campaign, with Lieutenant Governor Felix A. Tompkins, an ex-officio president of the Senate, directed the Democratic filibuster against the Republican majority, as the Democratic candidate for governor, the issue involved have been passed along to the voters.
