

WOMAN SHERIFF FILLS JOB CLAD IN GAY COLORS

CANTERBURY, Eng. (AP)—This ancient cathedral city has just received a custom of medieval times by conferring the office of sheriff upon a woman. Incidentally the recipient of the honor, Mrs. Lucy Green Webb, the wife of a local tailor, has the distinction of being the only woman in England to hold such an office.

"My chief duty as sheriff," Mrs. Webb said recently, "is to appear with the mayor and council on special occasions wearing my purple robe, with the silver chain of office around my neck."

Sounding the gavel-sheriff is responsible for most of the actual work in connection with the office, but there are still certain functions to perform. If a Canterbury man had to be hanged, for instance, I believe I should have to sign the document certifying that the execution had been properly carried out."

There were women sheriffs aplenty in the middle ages and in those days they had in addition heavy fiscal, military and administrative burdens. One of the first notable women of the middle ages to hold the office was the countess of Salisbury, who was sheriff of Wiltshire until she embraced religion and retired to the Abbey of Lanchester.

Work Begins on Gymnasium.
WINCHESTER, Ind.—Work on the school gymnasium in well started under contract of Edward Adkinson, Charleston, Wash., who has six carpenters employed. The building will be completed in 30 days, in time to start the basketball season. The gymnasium is to be approximately 50 by 70 feet, and will include dressing rooms, vocational room and probably a manual training department. The high school raised \$1500 for the gymnasium school activities in the last three years.
