permission to place tents on vacant sites and are seeking tents and equipment for a long while.

This situation develops at a time when there is a substantial and adequate supply of apartments and homes in Washington. It is not due to a housing shortage.

It is the price being charged for rental property that has brought the crisis, tenants declaring they cannot and will not pay higher rents, while landlords insist on jacking up rentals to new high levels.

The average price of an apartment room in Washington today, according to real commission's figures, is \$35 per month. That makes a three-room apartment cost \$105, a five-room suite \$175. In the face of these rentals a government clerk trying to raise a family in Washington becomes a financial expert. Otherwise he simply can't "get by."

Members of the rent commission declare that Washington landlords are agreed in a policy preferring to rent only two-thirds of their apartments at high rentals rather than all at a moderate rate, which would produce the same gross returns.

In addition to this, the crowding of families of from three to five people into "bachelorette" and "cubicle" apartments of two or three little rooms is already producing an unwholesome condition socially and physically.

These are the things that have decided tenants on a definite and determined campaign of resistance. "Well fight it out on this line if we lose all winter," is the slogan of the Tenant League Institute.

have reference to the circumstantial stories told by two Chicago witnesses and referred to before the committee last week by Samuel Untermyer, of New York, who said the stories, if sustained, might have a "pronounced effect" on the republican campaign.

Butler said

he had never heard of them before.

Discarded by Committee. Discussion as to whether it was proper to show the documents to the witness without having them spread on the record led Chairman Butler to make this observation:

"This committee at this point does not take any stock in the matter."

Untermyer said Senator Borah knew that he had expressed his own doubts about the whole matter and added that he had been very careful to see that the matter did not become public because corroboration was lacking. Besides Chairman Butler, half a dozen witnesses followed each other to the witness stand Thursday. Some interesting statements were developed on the issue of campaign funds and the work being done on behalf of La Follette by the railroad unions and other labor organizations. There also were frequent hits between counsel for the independent and republican committees and Chairman Borah, who conducted much of the examination himself, after warning that the committee might find it necessary to get along without the
