### PLANTS HELP FISH

An important help in supplying oxygen to fish is the use of aquatic plants. In a healthy aquarium where the plants purify the water for the fish, and the breath of the fish feeds the plants, we call it a "balanced" aquarium. We must not expect too much of the plants.

## GIRL'S ACTION FOILS ROBBERS; GET ONLY \$400.00

SALISBURY, Ore. (Special).—Three armed robbers, the oldest of whom apparently is about 20 years of age, entered the Aurora State bank shortly after 1 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, held up Miss Mildred Benoit, assistant cashier, and robbed the institution of approximately \$400 in cash, a few money orders and a number of checks. The fourth robber remained at the wheel of an automobile which had been parked almost directly in front of the bank.

Reports received at the sheriff's office here indicated that the outlaws had timed their operations and entered the bank immediately following the return of Miss Benoit from luncheon. She had just placed a tray of silver and cutlery on the counter near the wicket, when the three men, with revolvers drawn, ordered her to step back and remain silent. Miss Benoit complied with the command, but not until she had stepped on the burglar alarm, which is connected with both the Aurora telephone exchange and a drug store.

### TRACING BANDITS

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP).—Four men, who yesterday held up Miss Mildred Benoit, assistant cashier of the Aurora State bank and obtained \$400, were traced to Portland today. Officers obtained evidence that the bandits rented two cars here, one of which they abandoned near Monitor where the other was caught. They are believed to have come here in the second car.

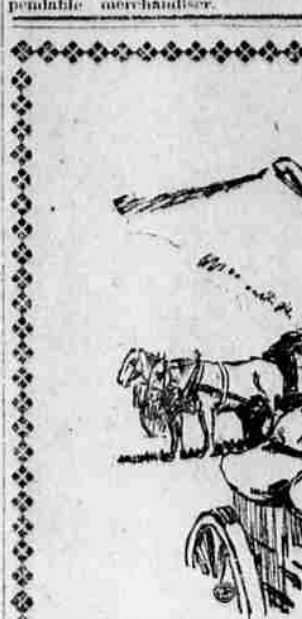
