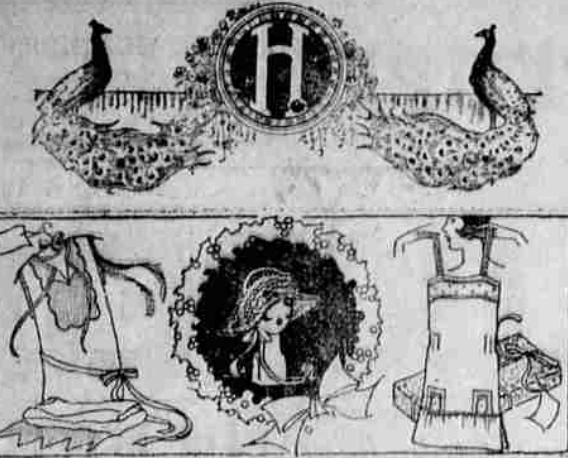


Yep, It's Mr. Kilbane Himself!

IDAHO WALKS OVER AGGIES

Stivers, for Vandal Team Accounts for All of 22 Points Scored.

CORVALLIS, Ore.—Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, final score: "Skipper" Stivers, 22; Oregon Agricultural College, 0. That in the way it looked to the sport spectators who watched the Aggie Friday afternoon on the Aggie football field. The football was sure enough for sport display or the story might be different.

The game was a teasing and kicking contest from start to finish. Stivers did not measure up to the O. A. C. on points. Idaho kicked 15 times and Aggie 14 times, but the Vandals so over-whelmed at passing that other matters are of small consequence. Stivers was responsible for every point made by Idaho. He passed the ball in the first part of the game that was carried for a

touchdown, and he failed to convert. In the same period he made another pass that Hamilton carried over for a touchdown, and then Stivers converted too. Score, O. A. C. 9; Idaho, 12.

In the second period he passed to Vester for a touchdown, converted the try for point, and Idaho led throughout the game with the score of 19 to 9, when, not five minutes before the game ended, he made a field goal from place kick and added three more points to his collection.

Seventeen Passes Completed. Of the 22 passes attempted by Idaho, 17 were completed for a total gain of 341 yards and 32 first downs. The Aggies completed 14 out of 42, for only 123 yards total gain and six first downs. Stivers' ability to place the pass made the difference. No one of the Aggie men is a specialist at it. Larayette threw all but three of the Idaho passes, and also made 53 yards out of the 86 Idaho got in scrimmage.

The Aggies showed better on line blocking. They made 99 yards against Idaho. Schumacher alone made 30 yards. Coach Schuster's men acted as if they were overwhelmed by the Idaho passing attack in the first half, although their line did good work all through the game, and the toe of Fred Toth saved them several times. But the punch with which they came back in the second half was surprising.

The Aggies had the ball in Idaho territory most of the third period. Three times they bore down on the Vandals' goal. A punt made over the goal line, a fumbled ball, and a failure to make downs from scrimmage lost the Aggies their best chance to score.

The ball was very slippery in the rain, which fell throughout the game. There were many fumbles on both sides, and several non-splendid recoveries. Penalties were imposed about equally on both sides. It was thought here that Idaho would have won last Saturday had she used as good an aerial attack against Stanford university at Portland. Substitutions were frequent on both sides. The final half of the fourth period was played in such darkness that the spectators could not see who had the ball, and the game finally ended with O. A. C. leading down on Idaho's goal, with ball on the 24-yard line.

Four Passes Intercepted. "Tom" Balcorn intercepted Stivers' passes four times, but could not make any return before the Vandals would have him down. In every department it was apparent that Coach Matthews' men were veterans, and Coach Schuster's players have much to learn and lots of experience to get. Edwards new man this year for O. A. C. played a fast game at quarter and on safety, after he replaced Price in the first period. O. A. C. has only two last-year veterans in the

BIG GAMES ON GRIDIRON DISH

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—Favorites in the most important eastern football games of Saturday were in most cases winners in contests with their opponents last year.

Yale, which hosts the Army in one of the feature games of the day, was a 31 to 9 victory over the Cadets in the bowl last season after West Point had taken the first half. It was in the Army game that the great 1923 Eli team found itself, and the battle this year is regarded as the going for an eleven which has had a long parts rattling in its games so far. The Army is stronger and said to have a different spirit than the cadets of last year.

Larayette defeated Princeton last season, and has about the same paper edge in the forecast for Saturday.

Neither team has been beaten this year, and stirring football is expected.

The meeting of old rivals at Ithaca, where Cornell and Columbia clash, and at Annapolis, where Penn State meets the Navy, have been declared to an extent by unusual events. The death of Percy Haughton, Columbia coach, was at first thought sufficient reason for cancelling the Cornell contest, but it will be played, with the elimination of all festivities.

Columbia Favored.

Columbia had reached its top form against Williams last week. Cornell has had two weeks in retirement after its two defeats, and no one knows what will come out of Ithaca. Columbia will enter the game a slight favorite.

The Navy meets Penn State, and seems destined to wait another

year for revenge over its 1923 defeat. Despite its two defeats by Georgia Tech and Syracuse, the Nittany lion is one of the strong teams of this season. The Navy has not only been beaten by Maryland, Princeton and West Virginia Wesleyan, but its squad was shattered this week by the loss of four stars, who failed in their scholastic requirements.

Barnmouth and Brown, at Haverock, will continue the argument which the Green won last year, Barnmouth, with a moral decision over Yale and a 6 to 0 win over Harvard, is favored to best the Bruins.

Syracuse defeated Pitt and should win again this year. Syracuse is still one of the three undefeated and untied teams of the eastern season.

Princeton, Harvard, Rutgers, and Lehigh will have comparative easy opponents.

Down to Clash with Illinois. CHICAGO—Iowa supporters today murmured a prayer that sophomore "Red" Grange, Illinois "point a minute team in himself," will not find the hole in the Hawkeyes' line which Fleckenstein left with a broken shoulder in Saturday's fight for the western conference crown at Urbana.

Their hopes were buoyed up by word from the Illinois camp that Willie Mellwain, an important

coach in the interference for the fleet Grange may be out with an injured hand and the ace may be slightly handicapped with a cold. Coach Bert Ingwersen led a determined Hawkeye squad in Urbana against the protests of its former mentor, Bob Zuppé. The towns were primed, particularly for Grange. Both teams held final drills in the country near Urbana Friday.

Michigan and Minnesota were ready to come to grips at Minneapolis. With the Wolverines was the traditional "Little Brown Jug" possession of which has gone to the victor of the Wolverine-Gopher game since 1902.

Couch Stange of Chicago had a well developed passing game prepared for Purdue here Saturday, but whether he would use it or rely on straight football was not indicated.

The Indiana "line" officially injured in injury to Northwestern's home coming celebration, the purple had its entertainment prepared for the Hoosiers.

Aside from the conference contests, intercollegiate interest centered on final preparations of Notre Dame and South Bend, for Georgia Tech. Injuries from last week's game affected both teams.

Wisconsin had no game scheduled for Saturday and confined its week-end practice to next week's tilt with Notre Dame. Ohio State expected only mediocre opposition from Wooster, a non-conference team.

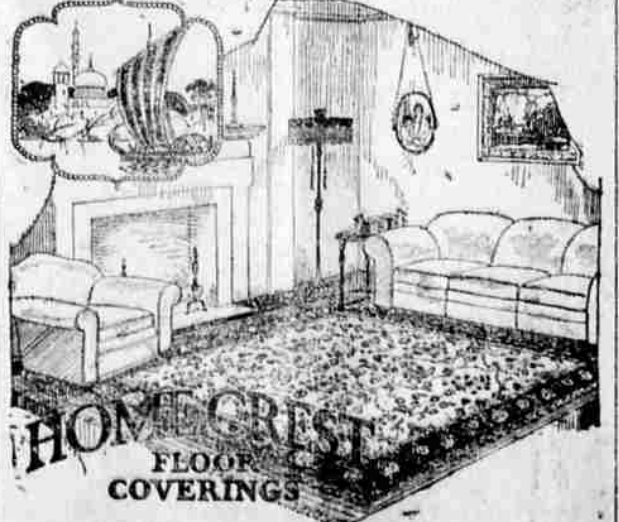


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
