

Threats to shoot Colonel B. A. Watkins, reputed head of the Klan, were made after he attempted to arrange a ball for four thousand Klansmen arrested on a charge of carrying concealed weapons.

Threats of trouble were seen in circulars announcing the Klansmen Klans meeting, urging members to "avoid bringing women and children."

Insurance of anti-klansmen to hold the meeting the same day as the Klan parade was interpreted as a "deterioration of warfare" authorities intimated.
