POWER RATE CUT FILED

SALEM, Ore. — The Mountain States Power company, with headquarters in Albany has filed with the public service commission a tariff providing for a general reduction in rates. The new tariff, if authorized by the public service commission, will effect 11,470 consumers and will reduce the annual revenues of the company approximately \$1,000,000 annually. Cities and towns affected by the new tariff include Albany, Junction City, Harrisburg, Halsey, Tangent, Monmouth, Cottage Grove, Jefferson, Springfield, Corvallis, Stayton, Lebanon, Rickwood, Rhoad, Colburg, Dallas, Independence, Philomath, Marion and all rural territory adjacent to these points. Under the new tariff the rate on all commercial and residence telephones in the cities and towns affected will be uniform.

The new rates became effective November 1.

POWER CONTENTS AILED

RENO, Ore. — Contents in which the larger irrigation district and the Central Oregon Irrigation company are opposed by the Columbia Irrigation Power company and the Deuchars Falls Power company were heard in the adjudication proceedings before State Engineer Loper in Reno. Questions of the standing of riparian rights in a similar case which developed recently at Hood River, but the court was almost equally divided on the opinion.

Another case was argued which will be brought before Judge Tompkins in the question of duty on water on lands irrigated in central Oregon. Irrigation interests are claiming a higher duty than that called for in their contracts, and if they prove their contention that no more water is necessary in needed, this will affect all future development on the Irrigation.
