## POPULATION OF STATE MORE

PORTLAND, Ore. (Special)—There are 525,422 people in Oregon today. According to a detailed survey just made by the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, the state's increase in population during the past five years has been greater than it was for the entire decade of 1910 to 1920. Through cooperation of the seventy-four commercial organizations affiliated with the state chamber, a careful estimate has been completed.

The five year period following the government census of 1920 shows a gain in population for the entire state of 111,273, or 19 per cent. The ten years prior to 1920 showed an increase of only 16.4 per cent. If the same relative growth continues the population in 1930 will be approximately 1,170,000.

Officials of the state chamber, who have followed closely the results which have come during the past season from the carefully directed efforts of the various communities to capitalize the returns from the national advertising of the railroads and other agencies, have it reasonable to expect the 1930 census to show at least 1,400,000 inhabitants in Oregon; if continued ideal interest in the development program is maintained.

Portland's present population is placed conservatively at 215,000. Clatsop county takes the lead with a 45 per cent increase for the past five year period, while Lincoln county is close second with 40 per cent; Josephine county is next with 36 per cent, then Lane with 35, Linn 46, Deschutes 41, Columbia 37, Coos 34.3, Jackson 33, Klammath 32, Douglas 30, Marion 27, Benton 24.8 and Multnomah 23. The increase for Tillamook and Yamhill counties is the same as the general state average and the other counties come in the following order: Crook 17, Baker 15.6, Union 15, Wasco 14, Clatsop 13, Harney 12, Polk 10, Clackamas 9.1, Umatilla 8.2, Washington 8, Hood River 4.9 and Gilliam 3.3. No estimates were obtained for the remaining counties, therefore the 1920 figures were used in the present compilation.

California and Stanford Left to Fight Out the Coast Conference Championship

With the Pacific coast football conference race just over, Stanford and California are the only undefeated teams. Southern California and Washington, which before Saturday's games also were in the running, met reverses.

The big upset, however, was Oregon's victory over Washington 7 to 2. Before the game Washington was favored to win by 10 to 20 points. The loss not only put Washington out of the Pacific coast conference running, but it placed Oregon in the lead for the Pacific northwest conference honors.

In the northern conference Idaho and Gonzaga also have clean states.

Idaho defeated Oregon Agricultural college, 22 to 0, Friday and Stanford won from Santa Clara, 20 to 0, the same day. Gonzaga won a close game from Montana, Saturday, 29 to 24.

Pennsylvania retained its lead for eastern conference honors by defeating Lafayette, 6 to 3. Before the game, Lafayette, Penn and Syracuse were the only eastern teams to win all their games.

Syracuse, although a big favorite, was tied by Pittsburgh, 7 to 7. Princeton walked over Westminster, 31 to 0, as expected, and Harvard defeated Boston university, 13 to 0. Yale and the Army played a 7 to 7 tie game. Penn State and the Navy put up a close game, the midshipmen leading 6 to 0. Cornell sprang a surprise and won from Columbia 14 to 0. Cornell's victory can in part be attributed to the badly demoralized Columbia team, which lost its coach, Perry Houghton, last week by death.

Notre Dame continued its victorious march by drubbing Georgia Tech, 34 to 3. In the Big Ten conference, Illinois defeated Iowa by surprisingly large margin, 26 to 0. Michigan won from Minnesota, 15 to 7. Indiana lost to Northwestern 17 to 7, and Purdue lost to Chicago 6 to 19.
