Freight train, also questioned, were released after railroad and car company officials promised Coroner Oscar Wolf that they would have them present at the inquest. Carl Olson, conductor, and Robert Glenn, motorman of the car, said the crossing gates were up as the car started across the railroad right of way.

Six Injured May Die—Physicians expressed doubt regarding the recovery of six of the injured, among them two small children and several women.

John Gaskett, a railroad switchman, told questioners the crossing gates had been lowered while some cars were switched on another track, but had been raised when the freight train was about 12 feet from the crossing. He said he shouted to the townward to lower the gates and signaled to the engineer of the freight train to stop, but the collision occurred before he made himself heard.

Olson, the conductor, said he saw the townward raise the gates and run in both directions, he stated, but did not see the approaching train and signaled the motorman to proceed.

Most of the passengers were relatives and friends who had attended a party in the neighborhood of the accident.

PORT PIERCE, Fla. (AP)—The famous Ashley gang of outlaws which is believed to have been exterminated Saturday night in a fight with officers, according to Sheriff J. H. Merrill of St. Lucie county, who arrived here early Sunday, with the bodies of four men.

Those killed are: JOHN ASHLEY, leader of the gang, 35, wanted on charges of

murder, bank robbery, highway robbery and piracy.
SHORTY LYNN, about 20, escaped convict, and sought on charges of murder and bank robbery.
HANFORD MOBLEY, 29, wanted on charges of bank robbery and highway robbery.
BOB MIDDLETON, 25, escaped convict and sought on charges of bank robbery.
None of the seven officers were hurt.

tant and, with these memories came a desire for leaders. Among the latter Cornelius Cole was an exception.
He continued to mine for gold, as did everyone else, but he also found time to serve the new county of Sacramento in the capacity of district attorney at a moment when the legally constituted authorities were taking from the Vigilantes the reins of law and order. This guided his steps along other political paths, and he became the real leader in the fight to keep California on the list of Free states. He took a prominent part in organizing the republican party of the Golden state, and later served on the republican national committee as the first California representative.
Elected Senator,

As an indication of the range of his political career and that of his wife, who shared his early experiences, it is sufficient to state that he was chosen a delegate to the convention which nominated Fremont for president, and that Mrs. Cole was a member of the delegation to the convention that nominated Charles E. Hughes for the same office more than half a century later. During the Civil war Mr. Cole occupied a seat in the House of Representatives, and in 1857 was elected to the United States senate from California, serving until 1873.

personally acquainted with the selector and his qualification as an elector, which affidavit shall be in the following form: (and the law gives the form).

It is a simple matter, as was stated before, and no one need fear that lack of registration will prevent one to vote if these steps are complied with. The "lawyer" will serve at the precinct voting place where he resides.

Voters will go to 37 precincts in Union county Tuesday. Thirteen of these are in La Grande, four each in Union and Elgin, two each in Otero and North Powder, and one in Altam, Tolmest, Medical Springs, Hildred, Hot Lake, Imbler, Island City, Kameia, Palmer Junction, Perry, Starkey and Sumnerville.

No Party Strings.

Two or three inquiries have been received recently asking whether a man, registered as a Republican or as a member of some other party, is required to vote for his party candidates at the general election. This is not necessary. At the general election no matter what party one belongs to, one can vote for any candidate regardless of his party. A few people have been confused as to this ruling owing to the fact that a voter must vote only for party candidates at primary elections.

COOLIDGE IS SURE CHOICE G. O. P. CLAIM

Democratic leaders countered with a claim that Davis not only would hold the south and the border states, but would capture enough electoral votes in the west and pivotal states of the east to put him in the White House.

There was the same conflict of

predictions as to the political complexion of the next congress. Both the Republican and Democratic congressional committees claimed clear majorities in the new house and gains also in the senate where 34 of the 56 seats are to be filled in Tuesday's voting.

31 Governors to Be Chosen.

In 31 states governors are to be chosen and in many states important questions of legislative policy are to be submitted for a popular verdict. An unusual number of tight gubernatorial races have developed, particularly in sections where the Ku Klux Klan has become a local issue. There has been a further complication of state politics, particularly in the west, by joint endorsement of certain candidates by the La Follette group and one or the other of the old parties.

In some sections interest apparently has risen to fever heat, but the party managers appear pretty much at sea as to the actual degree of interest the voters as a whole have taken in the campaign for the presidency. All the candidates have been greeted by large and noisy crowds yet from some sections there have come persistent reports of apathy. Various get-out-the-vote campaigns have been carried on by non-partisan agencies, but there has been no way of gauging how successful the effort has been. In some district registration figures have gone soaring; in others the stay at home percentage has been astonishingly large.

After "Silent Vote."

It is because of this element of uncertainty, which appears to weigh on minds of all party managers alike, that unusual efforts are to be made by each group Tuesday to round up at the voting places all possible strength. Those who are really confident by virtue of reports from their local leaders want to avoid a last minute surprise party engineered by the "silent vote." In the same way each group will turn the trick for it.

The Democrats have a far-flung get-out-the-vote machinery in the network of Davis Victory clubs which have been organized by the thousand over the country for that very purpose. A somewhat similar organization has been mapped out by Republican managers reaching down to wards and townships.

The La Follette supporters, who have inherited less of a combat party machine than either of their older adversaries, are placing their reliance in the zeal of local leaders, who have been imbued with

the idea of founding an enduring group in American politics.

So far as the state contests are concerned, there have been so many conflicting currents of campaign opinion, so many unusual combinations and so many plans for the election of split tickets that party managers at national headquarters privately admit they scarcely know what to predict.

UTAH CHAIRMEN MODEST

SALT LAKE (AP)—Statements of chairmen of the Republican, Democratic and Progressive state campaign committees regarding Tuesday's general election, were marked by the absence of definite claims.

"We have no doubt as to the result of either the national or state ticket," Carl Marcuson, Republican state chairman, declared.
