IDAHO INTERESTS COOLIDGE

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho.—Frank J. Hagenbarth, well-known stockman at Spencer, who is now in Washington, D. C., where he conferred with President Coolidge on agricultural and tariff matters, says that the president evidenced the greatest interest in agricultural matters in general and Idaho conditions in particular.
Mr. Hagenbarth states that the president is much interested in the tariff on sugar products, wheat and wool and that he feels assured that the president will not take any action whatever which will have the tendency to reduce the tariff on these products or other farm products, a report received here states.
A great deal of pressure has been brought upon the president by Cuban sugar interests and eastern sugar refiners as well as users of wool, in order to have the tariff on those and other commodities reduced.
Mr. Hagenbarth states that the president has the fullest appreciation of the benefits derived by the farming community from the tariff.

MOLALLA BOY IS KILLED

MOLALLA, Ore.—Raymond Bernard, 14, was killed instantly by a falling snag while he, his father and two brothers were rounding up cattle on the range.
The father had started home. The boys approached a burning snag, which they considered safe to pass. The snag fell. Two of the boys escaped unhurt. Other members of the family, who live on a farm they recently purchased seven miles south of Molalla, were summoned.
Funeral services will be held at Oregon City. Raymond Bernard is survived by his father and mother and nine brothers and sisters.
