Seathwaite's actions in the matter of weather have been eccentric, even for the British Isles, and during the last half century this place has recorded an average of 4.06 inches of rain in June, but in August there has been an average of 5 inches.

WALLOWA MEN ATTEND MEET

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special)—T. G. Johnson, S. T. Balle and Rev. George H. Pease attended the meeting of the Wallowa County Pomona grange held at Enterprise Saturday, November 1. The reports from the meeting state that it was a very successful one, a large crowd of grangers were in attendance, all of the granges in the upper part of the valley being represented by a considerable number of members. The main speaker on the program was W. W. Deal, state master of the Idaho grange, who delivered a very excellent address, dealing with the effect the organization and its activities have upon the community. W. R. Gekeler, deputy state master of La Grande, was also present. A bountiful feast was prepared and served by the ladies of the organization. The business meeting included reports of standing committees. An evening session was held at which time the fifty degree work was put on by a drill team composed of members of the Wallowa grange. The next meeting of the Pomona will be held here three months from this date.

The Halloween party given by the ladies of the grange of this place, Friday evening at the gymnasium was well attended. Refreshments of sandwiches, cookies, ice cream and coffee were served to the crowd, following supper the ghost stories were told, and games played until a late hour, all expressing it a very enjoyable occasion.

C. A. Hunter has had several teams busy on a part of his valley ranch east of town leveling up some ground. A number of farmers in the valley have started plowing some during the past week, reports state that the soil does not plow extra good yet, being quite dry in many places. Two good showers of rain have fallen during the past couple of days, and have wet the ground to a considerable depth. Many farmers say that the moisture has gone into the ground sufficiently to bring up the fields of fall wheat, which had not sprouted due to this extreme dryness of the ground.

The first coat of surfacing has nearly all been spread on the stretch of road east of the cemetery and reaching to the end of the market road on Whiskey creek. The work of constructing the rock screening plant on the Mumford farm was completed several days ago. The plant is said to be very efficiently built and can be operated by one man, and has a capacity of 200 yards of material per eight hour day.

The material is taken from the rocky hillside on the north side of Mr. Mumford's farm with a baggy scraper operated by cables from the engine. Bins and a chute have been built by which the trucks and wagons are loaded within a few minutes. The material is pronounced by experts as very suitable for road surfacing, being a mixture of porous rock and clay which packs well, and absorbs surplus moisture well.

Tom Bell, who had one of his hands amputated recently, as a result of getting it badly mangled while working at the planing mill of the Brown-Hicks Co., here, is able to be out again.

"Dude" Canklin of timber has been in this section the past few days selling apples. He reports the sale of apples at this time quite dull. A number of outside people have sold several truck

loads of apples here within the past few weeks.

Coolidge Vote Is Heavy In Oregon; Kay Leading Myers; McNary Winner

PORTLAND, Ore. (By the Associated Press)—All Oregon voted Tuesday to retain President Coolidge in office, giving him a total of more than two to one over both Davis and La Follette, according to returns tabulated at midnight.

Figures from 664 precincts out of 1760 in the state, all but three of 26 counties being represented, gave Coolidge 42,208, La Follette 18,218, Davis 26,121, Johns 415.

Senator McNary, with 482 precincts reported, had 22,472, Miller 12,227, Coulter 2,132 and Robinson 242.

In the first congressional district the lead of Representative Hawley increased as returns were received from 86 precincts out of 387 in the district giving him 5,823, Clark 1,921, Butler 1,021, Upson 161.

Sinnott Leading

Representative N. J. Sinnott had about a two to one lead in the second district, 54 precincts out of 498 giving him 2,257, Graham 1,756.

Crumpacker was leading Representative Watkins on the face of returns from 287 precincts out of 447 in the third district, Crumpacker having 18,634, Watkins 15,516.

And the way it rolled in proved business as usual in politics as in merchandising. Daughters of Confederacy

Will Convene at Savannah

SAVANNAH, Ga. (AP)—The thirty-first annual convention of the United Daughters of the Confederacy will convene here Wednesday, November 13. Preliminary exercises will be held Tuesday evening, November 12, in the municipal auditorium, while Monday, November 11, will be given over to visiting of committees and a conference of the division presidents in charge of the president-general will take place.

There are 150,000 members of the organization, with 1,125 chapters in 27 states and one in Cuba. Last year the United Daughters of the Confederacy contributed to scholarships and otherwise, \$200,000 toward educating worthy and needy young people.

Mrs. Frank Harrold, of Americus, Ga., a sister of Governor Walker of Georgia, is president-general of the organization.

SPINNING MILL PLANNED

SALEM, Ore.—The new Governor has approved an option requested by B. C. Miles, a local capitalist, covering the purchase from the state of 45 tons of flax fibre between July 1 and December 31, 1925, and 150 tons of flax fibre to be delivered during 1926. Mr. Miles and his associates have proposed to erect a modern flax spinning mill near this city.

It was said that the plant would cost approximately \$175,000, of which amount more than \$75,000 already has been subscribed. In selling the stock in the concern to investors will be warned that the enterprise is an experiment and no attempt will be made to see stockholders who are not financially able to share in a loss should there be any.

London May Have Cheap Theater

LONDON (AP)—A playhouse where seats may be bought for sixpence and a shilling is to be opened shortly through the efforts of a band of philanthropists, including Mr. Lloyd George, Lady Astor and Mr. Stanley Baldwin, who have started a campaign to raise 1500 pounds necessary to open the house. Only popular dramas and comedies will be presented.
