

UNION LOSES TO HERMISTON

UNION (Special).—With only two or three substitutes and with Pugh, one of the line, the Union football eleven went down to a decided defeat Saturday when they played Hermiston on the latter's field. The trip to Hermiston was made Saturday morning in the Del-Lap stage and this long ride in cramped quarters told against them in the game. Hermiston has a splendid team and walked over the local boys to the tune of over thirty points to none. After the game the boys started back to Union, but at Pendleton they were obliged to stop on account of car trouble, and remain in the Roundup city over night.

Lectures Enjoyed.

Saturday evening Union enjoyed the second number of the Edison-White lecture course when Dr. Henry Black Burns lectured on the subject of juvenile delinquency and its causes. Dr. Burns is a fluent speaker, a deep thinker, and sprinkles his talk with humor. His lecture is one of the best considered too gloomy. According to this man's ideas, and he has made crime and its causes a study for many years, the chief reasons for so many of our young folks going wrong, can be laid to the breaking up of the old fashioned home and its influence, too much pampering of children, and lack of respect for those in authority, both in the home and the school. His picture of the modern home are clearly drawn and strike right at the cause of this condition. He says it is nerve, caused by living too fast. Dr. Burns brought up one of the finest lectures to which Union people have listened for many years.

It was thought that the authorities had the upper hand of the outbreak of scarlet fever with the two homes first quarantined, but last week another family is displaying the flag. Two small children in the Wolf home in North Union, have come down with this disease according to a report of Dr. McKinnon.
