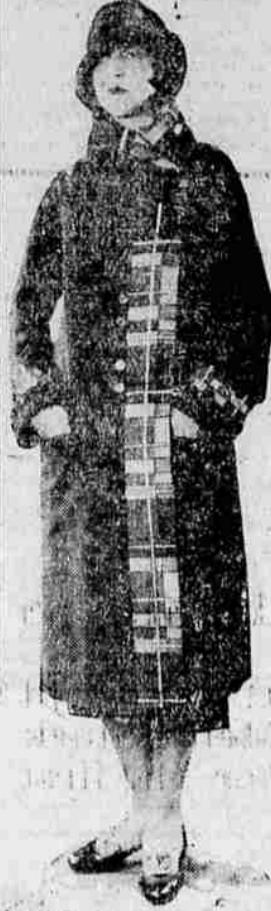


NEWS of SOCIETY

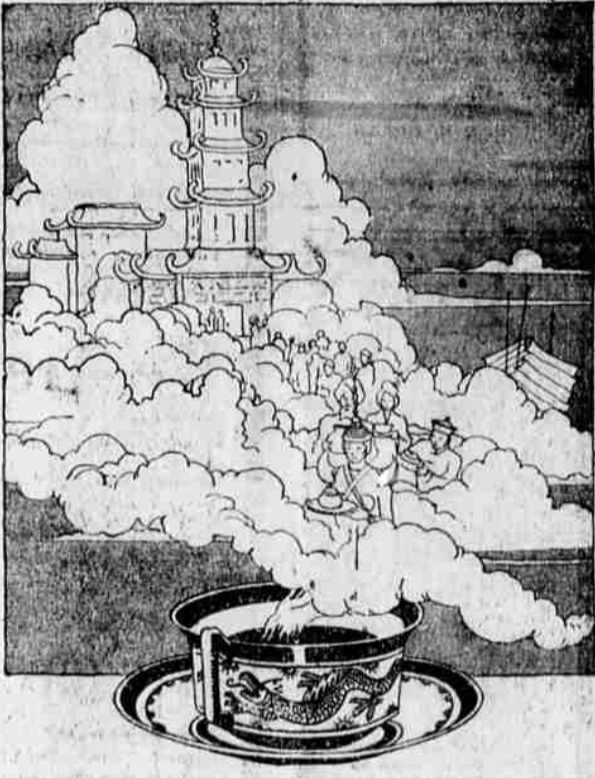
