(Continued from page 1) To be holding tight as the day closed, and the question seemed to be only the margin of the working majority for the party in the house and senate. The Republican, on the face of the available returns, were holding the gain they made in the count during the first 24 hours.

Senate Contests
Two senate contests were outstanding in Iowa. Senator Brookhart, who has supported the La Follette policies and who repudiated the Republican national ticket, was trailing his Democratic opponent, who has been credited with republican support, but the returns from the rural districts in Iowa were coming in slowly, and Mr. Brookhart was confident that would restore him to first place.

McCarry of Rhode Island; W. H. McManis of South Dakota and Gus D. Goff of West Virginia.
