INCREASE IN PRICE OF TEA WORRIES BRITON

LONDON (AP)—Things are bad enough as they are in England in the winter time, what with fog and rain, coal smoke and unemployment, but to make matters worse the price of tea has gone up. And there is not any prospect that it will come down again.

This may seem like a small thing, but to an Englishman it is serious, just as much so as an increase in the price of a loaf of bread to a Frenchman.

The British, seeking an explanation, are blaming "the foreigner." It seems that foreigners have taken up the tea habit and are competing with British buyers in the markets where this commodity is sold. In consequence of this large

world demand, tea is just as expensive now as it was before the labor government budget cut the tea duty down last spring, to the great pleasure of all the classes.

If the price climbs much higher there are some who think the British may be forced to become a coffee-drinking people again. Coffee was, after beer, their national beverage in the rollicking coffee-house days of Queen Anne.

OHIO VISITOR IS WOUNDED

SALEM, Ore.—F. M. Boldman of South Point, O., who is en route to Florence, Lane county, to visit friends, was taken to a local hospital suffering from a gunshot wound in the right arm. It was said that Mr. Boldman was placing a shotgun in his automobile when the trigger caught on the door of the machine. The full charge of shot entered his right arm near the elbow. Physicians said that Mr. Boldman was suffering from loss of blood, but apparently no bones were broken.

The accident happened at a camp ground north of Salem where Mr. Boldman spent the night.

COOK SEEKS DAMAGES

PENDLETON, Ore.—Damages of \$20,000 which she contended are due her because of injuries she suffered last March when she fell while employed on its ranch have been asked by Martha Cooper in a suit against the Pendleton Sheep company, filed in circuit court. The plaintiff set forth in her complaint that, while going from the cook house to the vegetable house over a board walk, one of the boards broke under her weight and she fell to the ground. Her left ankle and knee were injured and several ligaments torn loose, according to her allegations.

INJURED IN CAR UPSET

ST. MARIES, Idaho.—Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Hyde while en route to their home at Benewah ran off of the fill on the new Benewah highway near cherry creek. They were pinned beneath the car, which fell 50 feet. Mrs. Hyde, assisted by her husband, was able to get free from

the car. She then procured the back and lifted the car off her husband. Mrs. Hyde's head was badly cut and bruised.

HOOD RIVER, Ore.—A record attendance is expected here to participate in the Armistice day exercises staged by the Hood River part of the American Legion. The celebration will have a double significance, for on that day the city of Hood River will officially receive from Captain H. C. Coe of Manhattan Beach, Cal., the first flag ever flown over the city. Nathaniel Coe, founder of Hood River and father of the donor, made a special trip to Portland to obtain the materials from which the old-time emblem was made.

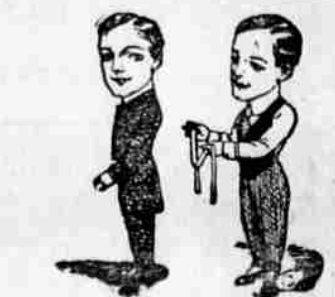
