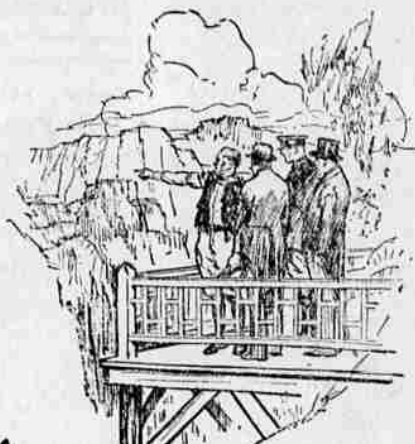
Another Storm Indicated.
