line at Goldenland and Pendleton. A supply of domestic aviation gasoline has been arranged for at these places but suggest you arrange with the Standard Oil company to have approximately 200 gallons of this gasoline on hand at La Grande.

Land East of City.
 "Any last minute information regarding the condition of the landing field will be appreciated. I believe we will use the field east of town where I landed last spring, unless you have a better one by this time. Regarding the expenses involved, the government will pay for all fuel and guarding. However, in case of bad weather on the return flight it might be advisable to leave the planes out of the mountains and return to Portland by rail, as the majority of the pilots must be back not later than the night of the twelfth. In such an event, it is believed your committee should reimburse the pilots for expenses involved. Kindly advise me regarding the condition of the field and the payment of actual and necessary personal expenses. Hope that we will be able to add a good feature to your celebration. The flight will consist of eight airplanes carrying sixteen members of the reserve. Signed, Oakley G. Kelly."

But La Grande Won.
 The securing of Lieutenant Kelly and his 15 officers and the planes was a difficult task and shows conclusively that the American Legion is making every effort to make this celebration one of the greatest in the entire northwest.

It was necessary to pull many wires to get help by congressmen and senators at Washington, and finally to appeal to the secretary of war before authorization was given Kelly through General Norton to come to La Grande.

The presence will undoubtedly be a feature that will be welcomed appreciatively by the thousands who will be here next Tuesday.

Elgin Put Him Over
 Then Elgin, feeling that it rested with her, put Stevens over the top with the help of Alford, Cove No. 1, Island City, Perry, North Powder and Summersville. His final majority in the entire county was 174 votes.

Vote Was Heavy
 Barely in the history has such an interesting election passed by from every standpoint.

To begin with, Coolidge and the Republican ticket was menaced by Davis and the Democrats and La Follette and his following. That alone was enough to drag out the vote.

In the state several important measures, including the income tax repeal, the compensation bill, a ridit measure, and one bill added to the race for senator between Miller and McNary and other similar contests, kept interest at a high point. And in the county and city, the many contests, each one important, combined with the newspaper efforts to get out the vote, completed in an excellent task.

Cast Over 5718 Votes.
 Allowing that every person in the entire county who voted did not vote in the race for sheriff, which drew the largest number of votes, it is assured that over 5718 votes were cast. Next in largest number of votes was the race for county coroner, with 5292 votes cast and third was the school race with 5591 votes cast.

La Grande Over 1600
 La Grande, it is believed, set a new high vote mark record by casting over 1600 votes. In a race with six entered, for city commission, A. T. Hill polled that number of votes.

Cherbourg to Have Post Station.

BROOKHART RETAINS PLACE, IOWA MOINER, Ia. (By the Associated Press)—Senator Smith W. Brookhart will return to Washington as Iowa's junior senator, unless the official canvass of senatorial votes cast in Tuesday's election of a recount upset the result indicated by the unofficial reports. The official canvass by county election boards is to begin next Monday.

Thursday night, with the unofficial count thoroughly rechecked, Senator Brookhart led Daniel F. Steek, Democrat, by 1116—the smallest margin by which any Republican candidate for a major office has won in Iowa in many years. The total vote, as compiled by the Associated Press, was: Brookhart, 447,523; Steek, 448,107.
