U. OF O. Eugene, Ore. (Special)—The Oregon freshmen and the U. of O. freshmen meet here in their annual football game today.

The Oregon freshmen, coached by "Doc" Williams, have defeated the Columbia University and Mount Angel College eleven this year. The team is handicapped at present, however, by injuries and will not present as strong a front as it did earlier in the season. Edwards and Metcoun, punters and backfield men, will be out of the game. Wetzel, fullback, has an injured ankle and may not play. The loss of these three men, all of whom are good kickers, has been a severe blow to the hopes of the freshmen. At the first of the season, Coach Williams had a squad of ninety candidates. This number has been pruned down to thirty-five.

### BOXING

#### CALIFORNIA LEGALIZE TWELVE-ROUND BOUTS

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—California has adopted by an unofficial majority of about 25,000, a law which will legalize 12-round boxing contests. Under the present law boxing is restricted to four rounds. No definite plans have been made by the sponsors of the measure to carry its provisions into effect, but promoters in San Francisco and Los Angeles where boxing is most popular, are considering the construction of big arenas with the idea of attracting pugilistic talent to the state.

The measure provides for a state athletic commission, which will regulate and control boxing and wrestling contests. Out of the gross receipts from the shows the state will receive an amount sufficient to pay the commission's expenses and to maintain a house for veterans of any war in which the United States has participated.

**JAPANESE LOSES TO DEIN**  
SALT LAKE (AP)—Ira Dein, claimant of the world's middleweight wrestling championship, won his scheduled match from Tarro Miyake, Jiu Jitsu world's champion, Thursday night, by pinning the second fall with his old reliable "knee" hold.

**DEER PAYS VISIT TO CITY**  
PAISLEY, Ore.—Following a violent storm in the early part of the night a large buck deer wandered down Main street past the court house, turned into one of the principal business thoroughfares and walked out of town through alleys and back yards of residents of the city.

Though no one is reported to have seen the deer, the tracks were large and sportsmen said the animal was undoubtedly a buck. The tracks were clear in the snow and showed that the deer had walked the entire distance through the city. It was thought he might have been attracted by the lights.

### BALTIMORE TO SEE BIG GAME

BALTIMORE (AP)—Applications for tickets for the Army-Navy gridiron classic, to be played in the Baltimore Stadium, November 29, are already greatly in excess of the supply allotted to Baltimore city for sale, those in charge of ticket distribution have announced.

Of the 75,000 seats provided in the stadium, 10,000 have been apportioned to Baltimore, and the remainder equally divided between the Military and Naval academies for disposal. With requests for seats from the city's share pouring into the office of Mayor Howard W. Jackson by every mail, the demand has far exceeded the number available by several thousand.

Every effort will be made to minimize seating. Orders have been issued by Police Commissioner Gauthier for the arrest of every person attempting to sell tickets and vigorous prosecution has been promised.

Mayor Jackson, after a conference with hotel managers, gave assurance that no "exorbitant" prices for rooms would be charged. William J. Quinn, president of the Baltimore Hotel Men's association, told the mayor that hotel rates have not been and will not be increased for the date of the game.

Mayor Jackson has also been in-

formed that ample hotel accommodations for visitors to Baltimore will be available. If indications should point to an overflow, however, the mayor said, an appeal will be made to citizens, and a list of rooming houses whose accommodations may be obtained, would be published.

Something new in the way of transporting fans to the scene of the contest has been announced, and reconstructed an old one, so that visitors will be detained within walking distance of the stadium.

Philadelphia have been contracted along these matters which are long enough to accommodate a 12-car train. Extra trains will be run from New York, Philadelphia and Washington. A great military and naval ball is being arranged by officers of the Fifth Regiment, Maryland National guard, to be held in that regiment's armory, the name of the latter, Colonel Washington Leary, commander, said the affair would be the first of its kind to his knowledge. All ranks, subaltern and other military and naval guests may take part and Rear Admiral Henry K. Wilson, superintendent of the Naval Academy, has granted permission for the two upper classes of the Academy to remain in Baltimore Saturday night for the ball.
