Anti-Rolling Tanks on Ocean

Liner Tested in Rough Sea

STOCKHOLM, (AP)—The efficiency of anti-rolling tanks was determined on the last trip of the Hapag liner Albert Ballin from New York to Hamburg, when the ship for the first time encountered rough seas. Scandinavian Shipping News reports that the gyroscopic pendulum indicated a rolling movement of six degrees against the horizon with the tanks in operation.

When the anti-rolling device was put out of service, the steamer rolled instantly up to an angle of 16 degrees.

U. S. Couplings for English Roads

LONDON, (AP)—English railroads are to adopt the automatic couplings as used in the United States and throw over their present system of coupling with heavy iron chains which have fastened to-

gether English cars since Victoria's youth.

Installation of automatic couplings will cost the English railroads about \$1,250,000.

COOS HIGHWAY OPENED

MAINEFIELD, Ore.—The state highway between Coos county and Florence was opened to traffic after a suspension of three days. The small portion of the Myrtle Point bridge which was washed out was replaced. The water has receded and train traffic was resumed south of Coos bay as far as Myrtle Point. Announcement was made that regular service would be extended to Powers tomorrow. Damage to railroad roadbeds was slight.

Reports from Curry county told of considerable damage to bridges and ranches, where much land was under water and feeding was a problem for the dairymen.

TELLS STORY OF ROBBERY
(Editor's Note—An account published in the Tacoma Daily Ledger, referring to the bank robbery there recently, is reprinted below. Mac Crowley is a former La Grande girl and has many friends in this city.)

Within three years almost to a day of when it was robbed under similar circumstances, the State Bank of Hoy was held up by two unmasked bandits at 2:30 Monday afternoon. Heavily laden with bags of silver, they made their escape in a commandeered automobile with nearly \$4,000 cash.

After being forced at the point of the desperadoes' pistols to turn over the money, Mrs. Mac Crowley, the only employee in the place at the time, was locked in the vault, with threats that she would be blown to atoms if she opened the door. Her brother, E. S. Emigh, the bank's cashier, finally came to her rescue.

Forced to Sit on Floor.
According to Mrs. Crowley's story the two men entered the bank shortly before 2:30, when the place was deserted of all except herself. Walking to the window of which she was in charge, they both drew pistols from beneath their shirts and ordered her to sit on the floor.

Both then leaped over the railing and took places beside her, quietly instructing her what to do. The older of the bandits took charge. He told Mrs. Crowley to go into the vault and bring out all the cash it contained. When she did so they were at her heels. She picked up a pile of currency totaling about \$1,500 and told them it was all there was.

"Some of that stuff!" the older bandit belittled. "Dash up all there is or I'll blow your head off."

Trembling with fear Mrs. Crowley handed them two large bags of silver, the entire contents of the vault. After satisfying themselves that they had cleaned the vault they forced her to open the cash drawer and hand over its contents.

But a few moments had been taken up and no one had entered the bank. The men then pushed Mrs. Crowley into the vault, with instructions to stay 45 minutes. She was told that a charge of dynamite would be placed at the door in such a manner that she would be blown to atoms if the door was moved a fraction of an inch.

Mr. Emigh's residence is but a few feet from the bank and about 10 minutes after the robbery his wife glanced through a window and noticed that Mrs. Crowley was not at her usual place. Seeing that something was wrong she ran to another

window and discovered the cash—empty.

Spreads Alarm.
She ran to the creamery across the street and notified her husband and several other men. Mr. Emigh effected his sister's release and seven men who were at the creamery—Steve White, marshal, George Nixon, Ben Nowak, H. L. Schmiden, Elmer Smith and John Turpening, all of Hoy—gleaned what information they could and took-out in pursuit.

WALLOWA VOTE NOW COUNTED

ENTERPRISE, Ore. (Special).—According to a local newspaper in the Enterprise city election on Tuesday, 523 votes were cast and P. H. Cole was chosen mayor and H. L. Forsythe and W. P. Savage were elected council members. These were the only offices on which there were contests, but the interest was sufficient to bring out a record vote. Two years ago 456 ballots were cast at the city election at which several contests were involved.

Councilmen to serve four years, two to be elected: H. L. Forsythe, 384; J. W. Henderson, 247; W. P. Savage, 240.

Three council members hold over, Sam Litch, L. E. Berland and M. E. Ward. The two whose terms of office expire the first of the year are Mr. Savage and C. A. Riley, so the only change on the board will be the appearance of Mr. Forsythe in place of Mr. Riley, who was not a candidate for re-election.

German Children as Truck Gardeners Prove Successful.

BERLIN, (AP)—A unique harvest festival recently took place in the industrial suburb of Berlin, Neu-Koeln. The International Cash Register company, a subsidiary of the Nation Cash Register company of Dayton, Ohio, has opened the American plan of turning over vacant land to children of its employees for gardening purposes. The festival marked the end of this year's experiment.

Thirty-five boys and 20 girls had cultivated strips of land each 20 by 10 feet. The average yield per child was: 166 heads of lettuce, 80 pounds tomatoes, 60 pounds cucumbers, 20 pounds cabbage, 20 pounds red beets, 25 pounds string beans, 25 pounds spinach, 25 bunches celery, 25 pounds carrots, 12 pounds peas, 10 pounds each of onions, radishes and kohlrabi.
