

SAVES MONEY BY MARRYING

CHICAGO (AP)—Marriage is the best financial investment a man can make, concludes Patrick J. Carr, treasurer of Cook county (Chicago), from a statistical survey in which averages were taken from 700,000 returns. "In fact, a man can hardly afford not to get married, if statistics mean anything," Mr. Carr added.

The survey of the tax situation here, made with a view of reaching any scientific conclusions on economy and money saving, shows that at 24 years of age the average husband has about five per cent less property, money in bank and taxable wealth than the average bachelor of the same age. "But when both reach the age of 28, the husband will be three per cent ahead and will continue to distance the bachelor more each year," said Mr. Carr. "The cost of marriage puts him back in the first comparison."

"At 35, the married man will average, in proportion to numbers, 17 per cent more taxable wealth ahead, despite the expense of and at 45 he will be 26 per cent larger homes, children and heavier wardrobe and living costs. The married man seems to work harder, save more and is more intensive in developing his business ability. There is a greater percentage of shrinkage one year to the next in the taxable property of a bachelor than a husband."

New Seattle-Seward Cable Laid by Army Signal Corps

SEWARD, Alaska (AP)—A cable of the army signal corps, renewal of which was completed here recently by the transport, Bellwood, linking Seattle and Seward, is 1,812 miles long and weighs 17,925 tons.

The cost of renewing the cable, which was established in 1904 with a line from Seattle to Sitka, Alaska, was put at \$150,000. Colonel George Gibb in charge of re-laying the cable, reported that the deepest place found was 2,413 fathoms, southeast of Middleton Island, 75 miles south of the Gulf of Alaska. The floor of the gulf, he added, was a smooth as the plains in the states. The line was laid at an average depth of 1,713 fathoms. The re-laying was begun in January.

HOW NATURE WORKS

The lady's slippers are really orchids, a class of plants so highly specialized to secure cross fertilization that over-specialization has almost been their undoing. The mechanism to secure cross pollination is so complicated and elaborate that self-pollination is almost an impossibility, says Nature Magazine of Washington. Pollination is usually done by langur bees that gain entrance in their quest for food through the gateway way afforded by an opening in the upper part of the large inflated lip. In the pink species, the gateway closes behind the guest who cuts his fill from glands found inside. After the feast, exit is secured only through a narrow passage in which pollen that may have been deposited on his back by another flower is combed out by a sticky, brush-like stigma. On the way out a new mass of pollen is dusted on the bee's back, to be carried to another blossom and thus is cross pollination secured.

Air Officials Predict A Commercial Increase

WASHINGTON (By the Associated Press).—Commercial aviation in the United States will forge ahead during the coming year if plans of the National Aeronautic association can effect it, Godfrey Lowell Cabot, president of the organization, who has taken on the task of directing its activities from its headquarters here, is advocating more landing fields with gas, oil and mechanics throughout the country, as an aid to the greater development of commercial aviation.

With the projected plan of making the ZII-3 a pioneer in this country, by demonstrating the practicability of air routes, interest in plating aviation on a business basis is believed by Mr. Cabot to be growing rapidly. At present there are not more than half a dozen commercial air routes in the United States. Promotion of an air service from Pensacola to Tampa, Florida, to obviate the present roundabout land travel skirting the Florida coast, and to insure a speedier delivery of mail "as the crow flies," will be one of the aims of the National Aeronautic association in the immediate future. Government and inter-city flying generally will be encouraged.

MAYOR GIVES SOUND ADVICE

SUMMIT, S. D. (AP)—An unusual "proclamation" was issued to residents of this village by Olaf Melby, mayor and pioneer merchant. This section of South Dakota has harvested one of the biggest crops in its history and Mr. Melby, in a message directed to the farmers of his community, urged them to take advantage of bounteous crops and high grain prices to recover and insure their stability.

"Now that we are harvesting the greatest crop in twenty years with prices above normal, I wish to speak to you as man to man," Mayor Melby wrote. "First, pay your obligations. For debts are like a log jam. Every dollar paid loosens this amount, as it does the merchant, the jobber, the manufacturer, the banker."

"Do not go into debt. Interest will kill the best individual in the community. Do not work your life out for the other fellow. Renters who pay up their obligations this fall ought to buy a farm. But do not pay a thousand dollars down on an \$8,000 obligation. If you cannot pay one-third down, buy forty acres instead. Land will never be so cheap again in our time. Buy a home, a farm, a means of livelihood for yourself and your family.

"Do not expect to get rich quick. You cannot make any money unless you invest it in your own business. Do not give up the old cow, or the hogs and sheep. They require a little care that means work, but they never will fail.

"Your home people are interested in you and your welfare. Do not let strangers tell you what to do. Better ask your neighbor, banker or merchant. Or, stickers only want your money. Stick to your community, and you and your family will wear diamonds."

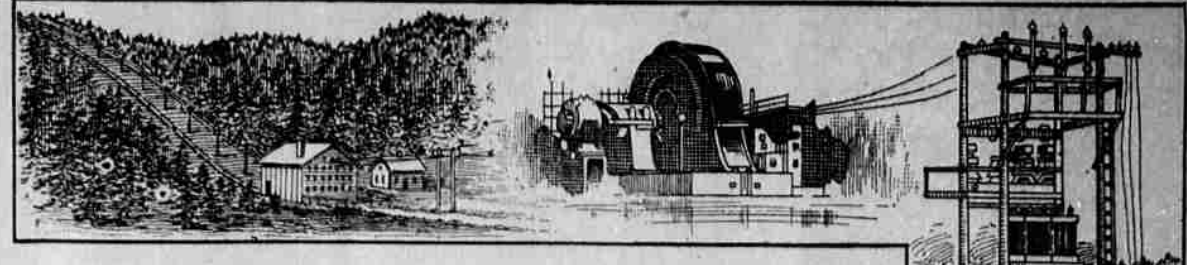
EDITOR WILL PRESIDE

A general session of the conference will be held Friday afternoon and a banquet will be provided for the delegates.

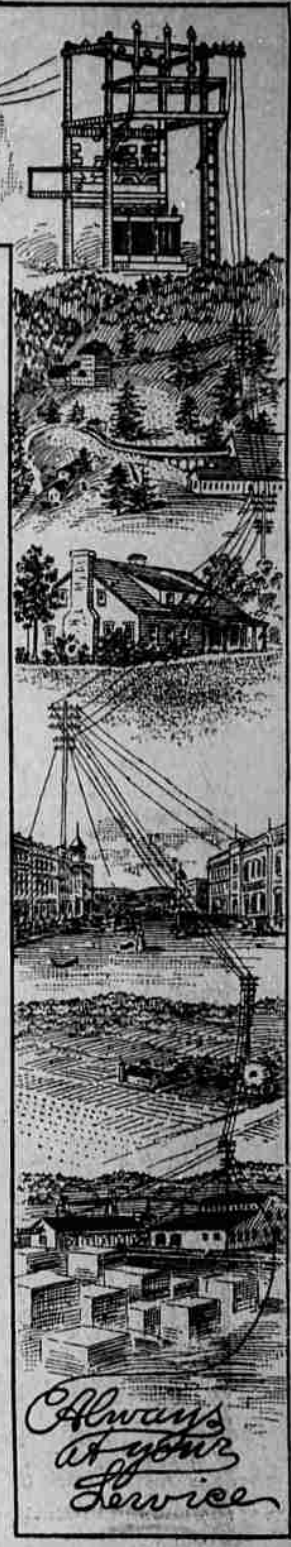
ELKS TO VISIT ALBANY
