Hints for the Housewife

"JUST DIFFERENT" BAKED APPLES

In most localities apples are abundant at practically all seasons, but they are inclined to be better at this particular time of the year. Perhaps no one fruit lends itself to serving in more varied ways and a baked apple doesn't necessarily mean the usual kind that is served at breakfast. Baked apples filled with tempting dainties would never fail to make an appeal on dessert.

Select six large firm, tart apples, core and pare them about one-third of the way down from the stem end. Place them with the peeled surface upward in a deep enameled ware dish the vitreous porcelain-like surface of which makes it perfect for this use. Make a syrup of one cupful of sugar and one and one-half cupfuls of water boiled together for six minutes. Squeeze some lemon juice over the peeled part of the apples, pour the syrup over them and bake in a moderate oven for ten minutes. Then remove from the oven and fill the cavities with a mixture made of chopped dates and raisins which have been mixed with cinnamon and marshmallow. Return to the oven for thirty-five minutes and bake occasionally.

Flag to Be Given City.

HOOD RIVER, Ore.—Anniversary day celebration here will not only call citizens of the mid-Columbia together to observe the anniversary of the great war's end but at the public meeting scheduled at a local theater, the town's first flag will be officially presented to the city by Captain H. C. Cog, pioneer Columbia river steamboat operator. Nathaniel Cog, father of the donor and founder of Hood River, in June, 1861, made a special trip to Portland to obtain materials for the old flag, which was raised at community picnic on July 4, 1861.

The flag will be turned over to the city by M. D. O'Dell, president of the Oregon-Hood River Pioneer association, and E. C. Smith, city attorney, will deliver the address of acceptance.

three weeks. The houses were erected as an experiment owing to the dearth of dwellings here and it is planned to build more in the hundreds if the scheme proves practical.

The frame of the houses consisted of two sets of boarding which were set four or five inches apart, the intervening space between the boarding being filled with sawdust which had been treated with a chemical preparation which made it non-inflammable. A coating of plastering was applied to the outside of the boarding and a family from the Vienna stans moved into their new home 21 days after the work was begun.
