Cricket Flat Society Hold Successful Basket Social and Bazaar.

ELGIN. (Special)—In the spring of 1923 the women living in the vicinity of the Cricket Flat cemetery and others interested in keeping up and improving the burial ground, met and organized the Cricket Flat Cemetery Society. They set a small sum as dues for those who kept up a membership and commenced putting the cemetery in order. They set up markers at as many of the old graves as they could learn about, reared the stones that were neglected, placed comfortable benches and had a chimney built that made it possible to heat the little building that is the only protection against inclement weather and also had two driveways constructed through the cemetery. Flowers and shrubs were planted and efforts made to beautify the grounds. In order to accomplish all this work it had become a custom to hold a basket social and bazaar each fall to bring

in the necessary amount of money. This social was held this year at the Highland school house. An excellent program had been arranged by the committee, most of the numbers having been prepared by Miss Belle Tracey and the pupils of the highland school. In addition a vocal solo by Mrs. Ray Blanchard, readings by Mrs. John Gokeler and Mrs. Lynn Hill and a recitation by Frederick Hill made up the first part of the evening's entertainment. The selling of decorated lunch baskets followed, while a committee served sandwiches, cake, pie, pickles and coffee to those who had not brought or bought boxes. The last part of the evening was devoted to selling the articles of needlework contributed by the women, and a fish pond for the younger ones created much merriment. The total sum raised during the evening was between \$35.00 and \$50.00.

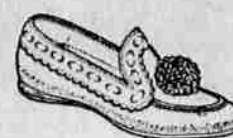

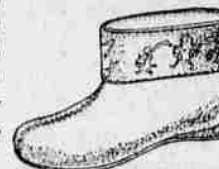
