Sabella was overjoyed. It was good to live a little longer. She rushed home to her five children. She has been free on bond ever since—working, praying, waiting. So has her second husband, Peter Crupelle, who was given death along with her. He is a mere youth in his twenties and worked as a laborer on Sabella's farm before he married her.

The state contends they murdered the first husband to get him out of the way. Months later, what the state said was Nitti's body, was found floating in a sewer near Stuckey, Ill. Positive identification, however, never was established.

At least that was the opinion of Supreme Court judges when they matched Sabella and her second mate from the neck.

Son Witness. The woman's 10-year-old son was the principal witness against his mother. He told police that he had seen his father's body being taken away. He said he saw the second husband dump it in a drainage canal. But when officers dragged the stream no body was found.

"We no kill him," says Sabella. "Me no pretty when tried. Jury may me guilty. Jury no like honest woman."

"But now me get new trial. Me have fur coat—ink stockings. Jury no say me guilty this time. Pretty women always not guilty. Me no guilty. My husband no guilty."

Thus, in her petulant sort of way, Sabella visions life at least and freedom, too, of her second deal with Fate.

Farming Now. Since her release from the death house Sabella has gone back to farming. Her hands are calloused from digging in the ground and her face is burned by the heat of many days in the fields.

But Sabella does not care. The effort earned the few pennies necessary to refresh her wardrobe. It provided, too, some powder and a bit of rouge.

At her new trial Sabella plans to make a hit.

WINDS DAMAGE 'PHONE LINES

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special).—The heavy wind storm of Friday evening did a considerable amount of damage to telephone lines in this end of the valley. On the Home Independent Telephone Co. main line about a mile and a quarter east of town a number of poles carrying a large number of wires were broken off by the wind and fell into the road. Many of the wires were broken and tangled, putting rural subscribers out of central service for several days. The broken lines are being repaired as rapidly as possible, but together with damage from the wind to lines in other parts, the work of repairing is quite slow. The farmers' telephone line extending from town east into the leap section was also damaged in many places. A part of the line was repaired the first of the week so that the line was in working order again.

The snow which fell here during the past two or three days has covered the ground in the valley to a depth of three or four inches, and somewhat deeper in the hill sections. Much of the pasture has been covered by the snow, and cattle are being fed on the feed lots. Stockmen in the valley were busy the first of the week getting the stock onto the feed lots, and getting out feed. Horses are able to do fairly well in the bunchgrass pastures yet, as the snow is loose, and they are able to get feed.

The hill roads are very difficult for auto travel at this time. The ground is not frozen beneath the loose snow. The rural mail carrier on route one, extending from town to the east through the hills, failed to get through Monday with his car. He was able to get about half the distance around the route when so much snow was encountered that he could get no farther, and was compelled to turn back. He has changed his mode of conveyance and is now using a horse and cart.

Snow Deep. H. O. Anderson went to the north woods to work the latter part of the week. He is skidding logs for Charles Potter, who is cutting for the Brown-Hicks company by contract. Reports from that section state that the snow is nearly a foot in depth.

Lester Crow and daughter Mrs. Cecil Childers and Mrs. George West of Lostine were among the visitors here the first of the week.

E. L. Roberts of Enterprise was here on business the first of the week.

Full plowing which was in progress in many parts of the county and week has been stopped due to the snow. The ground had just become wet enough for good plowing and many were taking advantage of the opportunity. The snow continues to fall. Many express the opinion that the snow now on the ground will melt away in a short time, as the ground is not frozen to speak of anywhere.

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RAIL OFFICIALS VISIT BEND
