

Two Kansas Women Care For Suffering Animals

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP)—Out in the hills of Kansas, across the Missouri river from here and close by that stream, two lone women, Sarah H. and H. H. Jacobs, sisters, are making a sacrificial fight for friendless and suffering animals that are winning them world fame.

These women, by stint and industry, acquired a little home in the outlying district that is given over unselfishly and almost completely to housing discarded dogs, cats, birds and horses, and to spreading the gospel of humane endeavor.

In order to carry on their chosen work, H. H. Jacobs works as a bookkeeper, going a dozen miles daily to her desk, while her sister, white-haired and frail, is housekeeper. In the 20 years since they began the enterprise, and it has been carried on solely through their own means and without monetary recompense, the Jacobs sisters have cared for hundreds of animals, patiently nursing the sick back to strength and providing for the strays and disowned till good homes were found.

Many Friendly Acts.
In their community neighbors testify to friendly acts of these women that have touched human life as well, so there has been no criticism that unnecessary time and money were expended upon animals while youth went neglected.

Boys and girls, as well as grown ups, for miles around call regularly at the Jacobs home for advice in caring for their pets, and the Misses Jacobs take advantage of the visits to drive home lessons in humane treatment and correct living.

One example of appreciation is the action of Governor P. P. Baxter, who caused the state house flag at Augusta, Me., to be displayed at half-mast when Garry, his Irish setter and faithful companion, was buried with seven of his forebears. The Jacobs are proud of Governor Baxter's friendship, and display his photograph when the incident is related.

Miss H. H. Jacobs, in speaking recently of their work, said: "Governor Baxter's photograph occupies a prominent position in a semi-public room of our house. In the evening it has been the custom for the boys to come in and have a look at it. When a new boy comes, the older ones take the attitude of proprietorship. 'That's him,' they announce expressively. 'Chapple' and 'Brownie' and 'Pal' come along as also, and it has been decided that these dog companions of the boys all show some resemblance to Garry."

"Governor Baxter, replying to those who criticized him for lowering the flag in honor of his dog, said: 'I did it, not because Garry was my dog and a member of my family, but to draw people's attention to the qualities of the dog, qualities which are so often forgotten in human relationships.'"

Not Alone in Work.
"We are far from being alone in this work; if we were, we should despair," Miss Jacobs continued. "M. K. Matthews, honorable secretary of the National Equine Defense League of London, England, writes: 'We should find work for reform in treatment of horses almost impossible had not the horses been my friends and companions from early childhood.'"

"C. W. Howard, formerly of Iowa, now engaged in humane work in the Philippines, states that it does less good to arrest a man ten times for beating his horse than to get just the beginning of a thought into the fellow's head that all living creatures have rights that should be respected."

"There is a woman who has honored us with her interest in our work here and that is Mrs. Minnie Madden Plske, the actress, widely known for her humane efforts."

"The fight for the establishment of justice and recognition for animals is a fight largely against ignorance. There are certainly legalized cruelties that seem to have gained a strong foothold, but public feeling is veering and the end is in sight. With this vision, this guiding thought always before us, we must go on. Every day brings new needs and duties."

Animal Refuge.
Some time ago, through the efforts of the Jacobs, a public animal refuge was started to care for the unfortunate that could not be treated at their small place. Sarah H. Jacobs had a large part in this project as president of the local humane society, which she manages along with her other responsibilities.

"In earlier years," said Miss Sarah H. Jacobs, "if a dog or pre-

tended, it meant a cruel death. Now he goes to the refuge and is given decent attention until his friends can come forward and speak for him."

Dog Exonerated.
"Last week my sister signed a sworn statement as a character witness for 'Buddy,' who had torn Mr. S—'s trousers, and Buddy went home exonerated. In fact, it finally looked as though Mr. S— should have felt honored, by the time the judge had dismissed the case."

"This clean, new idea of giving the dog a square deal appeals to everyone."

Miss Jacobs told of "Shep," the dog that wouldn't stay away. Although three homes were found for "Shep," he returned each time. Twice he brought other dogs home with him. Once he brought back a "prisoner" dog that had managed to slip out.

"Humane work is very broad and far-reaching. It reaches clear to the top, and all of it is the working out of the universal plan. Our own animal family now numbers 42, with frequent visitors."
