**FAKE CHARGED IN RING BOUT**

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Fred Fulton, Misses' player, who Monday night "took" the count after 22 seconds of fighting in a bout at Colver City, with Tony Picard, Mexican heavyweight, was arraigned in justice court here late Tuesday with his manager, Jack Reddick, on charges of violating the state law against prize fighting. The pair were released on each half of \$1000 each, pending preliminary hearing next Friday.

Meanwhile, district attorney's investigators and Colver City police, who had been searching the countryside for Picard and his manager, Fred Winsor, were notified telephonically by the latter that he and Picard were busy rounding up bail money and would surrender to the authorities early Wednesday when they expected to have the cash.

Despite this message, however, the search for Picard and his promoter continued.

Fulton was arrested as he was leaving his hotel in Colver City Tuesday, suitcase in hand. He was brought before Burton Pitts, chief deputy district attorney, still hugging the suitcase and questioned concerning reports that the fight had been "faked."

"If the fight was framed will I go to jail?" he asked.

"If the fight was framed I expect you to say so," replied Pitts. "Was it framed?"

Fulton declined to answer.

"Were you supposed to be knocked out in the first round?"

Again he refused to answer.

"Were you to receive money for being knocked out in the first round?" persisted Pitts.

"I refuse to answer," Fulton replied. "I'll be made the goat sooner or later, anyhow. I deny that there were any arrangements for Reddy or Winsor or Picard, and I deny that I was to be knocked out."

Fulton and his manager, who had also been taken into custody for questioning, were then arraigned.

**WASHINGTON IS SORRY TO LOSE WALTER JOHNSON**
