This week has been set aside by the United States congress as "Education Week." The English and history classes are observing the week in various ways. Some very effective slogans such as "Bullies, not Bullies," "Master the English Language," and others are constantly heard.

The Senior English classes are giving oral compositions on subjects pertaining to the value of education. Some very good talks have been delivered thus proving that La Grande high has some promising orators.

Have determination! Figure out things for yourself. Be honest with yourself. Take up the work you love to do. Have confidence. Have a disposition to study. Do not think you can do anything without it? When you are told if you will do something, do it. Do not think you can not do anything. Have loyalty and patriotism. As soon as you accept an occupation, be loyal, study it, have hope. Stick to it, so to speak. Everyone of you have made a resolution (at some time or other) that you would study 20 to 30 minutes every night then you lie down on the job. The want to instill in your minds is regularity. Be consistent; endeavor to put it over. Actually do it! I ask you to have the go-get-it spirit, then this matter of education will come easy to you, and to others, and the standard of education will be better for the nation."

The second year short hand class has been working diligently. During the assembly Monday afternoon, several of the girls had a chance to prove their ability by taking down Mr. Landis' speech in shorthand. As this was their first experience of that kind, there were no perfect copies.

A number of commercial students received typewriting certificates this week. These are given by the Underwood Typewriter company to all students who are able to write thirty words or more a minute for fifteen minutes.

Six weeks examinations are again under way. Consequently many students are temporarily forgetting the more pleasant evening diversions, and are burning midnight oil.

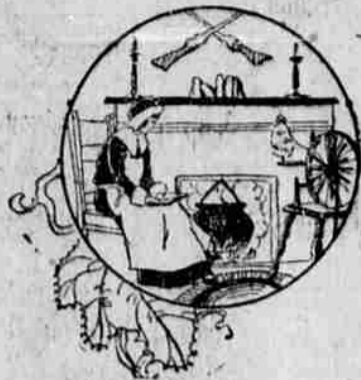
The orchestra selections for the holidays came last week. Practice was held for the first time Monday.
