Editor Observer: I was pleased to note in your issue of November 6th a communication written by a Mrs. J. T. DeVore of Clover creek. This lady evidently is a close observer and offered some very good suggestions regarding our buck deer law. I know there is some agitation going on with a view to change the present law and permit the killing of deer. I believe this change is advocated mostly by hunters who have taken snap judgment in the matter. I am sure such a change would soon prove to be a grievous and costly mistake that would take years to rectify.

Mrs. DeVore makes several telling points against the proposed change and I for one can corroborate her on about all of them. My views and opinions are based on actual and close observations covering more than a third of a century. In my opinion there are plenty of bucks left but the casual or unobserving hunter does not get to see them. For years bucks have been singled out for slaughter while does have enjoyed comparative safety. This has had a tendency to make the former more cautious and the latter less so. No doubt many young bucks are mistaken for does too, and then after their horns are shed it is often hard to tell bucks from does when you get a mere glimpse of them. In most sections timber fires have been prevented for years and the brush and young forest growth is ten times as dense as it used to be. This is taken advantage of by the bucks and fawns especially. The true conditions can be told more correctly by noting their tracks and other signs left in the thickets where they feel safe from pursuit. It should also be borne in mind that a doe without a fawn is not necessarily a barren doe. Naturally some fawns die or are killed. In some cases the fawn may be hiding nearby in the brush. When we consider how ruthlessly the deer are hunted for two months and more at a stretch it is remarkable that there are not more barren does. A large part if not all of this time encroaches on the breeding season of the deer, and we ought to realize the bearing that has on productivity. In spite of all this and the further fact that the number of hunters is much greater than it used to be, that firearms have been greatly improved and remote sections made far more accessible, there is no question about deer being on the increase. That itself is a convincing proof that there is no such thing as scarcity of bucks as some people seem to think there is. About the only factors tending to promote this increase are the greater density of the forests and the decrease in predatory animals. I know a large section of the county where deer were never seen 25 years ago and am reliably informed they are often seen there now. I also know they have been increasing in the Mt. Emily section for years. Twenty and more years ago they were not as plentiful up there as they are now but bear, cougar and coyote were more numerous.

I feel it would be a great blunder to permit the killing of deer now. For every actual barren doe a large number not barren does are killed too. This would be cutting off the supply at its source instead of helping to increase it. A lot of dead does would certainly not make up for any temporarily barren ones. Many of them would have fawns too and these would often perish after losing their mothers. As Mrs. DeVore pointed out, the reckless hunter would not need to look for horns and this would greatly increase the chances of his killing or mauling other hunters. There is already too much of that and this angle of the matter should itself stop all thought of such a change in the law, I am therefore in favor of leaving the law as it is in that respect. Would rather be limited to one buck than to legalize the killing of does. If we really want to do anything for the poor deer (and indirectly for ourselves) let us do one or more of the following: shorten the open season; give them all possible protection during the winter months; establish a few refuges or sanctuaries where they can breed in peace and safety; kill off as many of their natural enemies as possible and last but not least prevent timber fires from burning up their feeding grounds and natural refuges.
