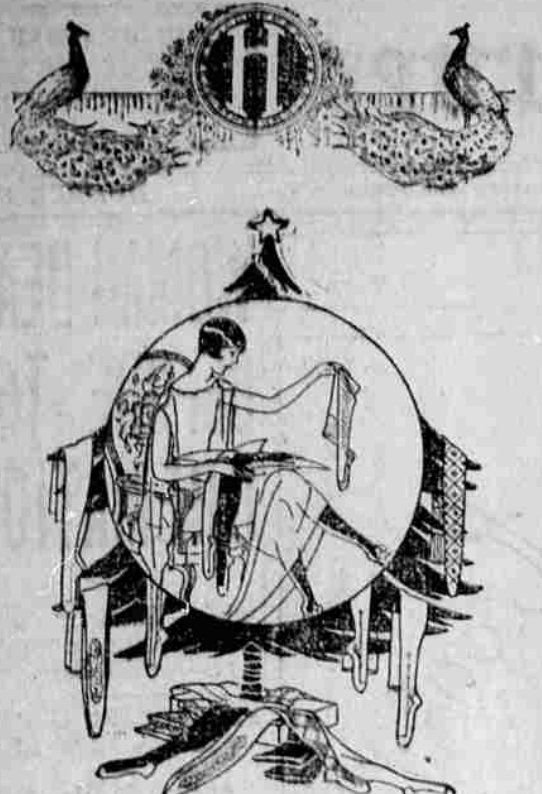
The fall wheat which did not get up before the storms of a couple of weeks ago, due to the dryness of the ground, has been coming through under the snow.

Three Outstanding Thrills in 2 Years

(By SCOPM) Unforgettable moments. Every one experiences them, and as Grandland Rice states in a recent issue of Collier's, these memories never grow cold.

After a person has witnessed some 100 or more exciting contests, ranging from billiards to baseball and from horse races to football, it is fairly difficult for that person to be given a major thrill—but not impossible.

The writer can point back to three thrills that are outstanding, all happening in the last two years. One was in basketball, one in football and one on the track.

Picture a crowded hall where a district basketball tournament for the championship and a subsequent trip to Salem to play for the state title. Then the fight really begins. Two minutes, two minutes, three breathless minutes pass and the situation remains the same. Both teams are fighting like unshattered lightning. Hound and round the ball slips a calfskin glove, propelled first by the hands of one man, then by another, first in one team's possession then the other. Then the ball loops swiftly toward the hoop but hosiater and falls back. The score would have put the bigger team ahead.

Then the timekeeper finds there is but half a minute—thirty seconds—left. The smaller squad has the ball. Fighting them with a tenacity that is remarkable, the opponent expends a last ounce of energy to get possession of the sphere and both teams clash with a ferocity that is rarely equalled. And then ZOOM, the pistol marks the end of the game and the team that was better conditioned won.

Picture all that and you have one of the greatest basketball thrills in years. It happened at Union this spring and gave La Grande the right to go to Salem.

Change the scene to an athletic field, with the sun transforming it until it became a setting of green and brown, fitting for such a clash. A track team, proud winners for years and years, trotted onto the
