NEW CHURCH OPENS SUNDAY

Elegant New Episcopal Edifice to Be Dedicated by Bishop Remington.

Dedication of the new Episcopal church at the corner of Fourth and O avenues will take place tomorrow and Bishop Remington, head of the Eastern Oregon diocese, will preach the dedicatory sermon, assisted by Rev. Mr. Cressley, rector of the La Grande church. Special music for the occasion will be a feature of the service, and the long-cherished new Episcopal church will be dedicated open permanently for religious worship.

Standing on the ground which has been consecrated for many years by a house of worship, in fact the ground was occupied by one of the first churches to be erected by Christian people in Eastern Oregon, the new stone structure just completed, marks another epoch of advancement in religious life of the inland Empire.

Several of the congregation who tomorrow will devoutly take part in the service have been members of the Episcopal church many years, many enjoying the services in the old church when it was one of La Grande's few meeting places.

No building when wrecked to make room for a new structure has carried so much sentiment as the old Episcopal church, and for a time it seemed possible to preserve the structure for its fine early day association with the people of the interior country. Judiciously dismantled, differently and it was removed to make room for the splendid new church building which tomorrow begins its usefulness to the community.

Berlin Decides Auto Buses
Will Benefit City Transit
BERLIN (AP).—Confronted with increasing street traffic, Berlin has decided to operate automobile buses. During 1925 250 buses, running on 14 different lines, will be installed. The new cars will seat 54 persons each, and will have upper decks.

Manager Kaufmann of the Berlin Autobus company, who recently went to the United States to study city transportation conditions, believes the bus is the vehicle of the future for congested metropolitan districts. He says that the Berlin buses are more powerful motors than are automobiles in America, which makes possible a quicker start, and that the local custom of stopping only at designated streets results in a speedy service.

Baby Skyscrapers Beginning To Show Themselves on Rhine
COLOGNE (AP).—Cologne and Düsseldorf, both on the Rhine about 50 miles apart, have engaged in a race to see which city will build the tallest so-called skyscraper.

Dusseldorf started the movement last year, soon after the French occupied the Ruhr, completing an 11 story office building which is planned to with pride by the citizens as the tallest building in Germany. Cologne, occupied by British troops was determined not to be outdone. Last summer Cologne began work on a 12 story building, and recently the Dusseldorfer announced that their 11 story pride is to have two floors added to it as soon as the Cologne skyscraper reaches 12.

While the Cologne-Dusseldorf controversy was at its height, Hamburg quietly began work on an office building which is planned to reach 14 stories.

ROSE PLANTS SHIPPED EAST
PORTLAND, Ore. (By the Associated Press).—Shipments of rose plants and cuttings from this city to the rest of the United States and other parts of the world have increased nearly 10 percent this year, including shipments made for the autumn planting season, which is now at a close.

Approximately 55 carloads of rose plants have been exported for domestic and foreign planting during the year. Between 15 and 20 carloads were shipped by one nursery alone, which is among the largest rose-growing nurseries in the country.

While purchases of roses from here show an increase in various states, Missouri, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas show the largest comparative increase in purchases. Florida, for the first time bought rose plants here this year. Large exports have gone to Canada, Alaska, Japan and the Philippine Islands.

MIL. KAY NAMES DEPUTY
SALEM, Ore.—Thomas H. Kay, state treasurer-elect, appointed George P. Griffith of Salem, as deputy state treasurer. In event Mr. Griffith accepts the appointment he will enter upon his new duties January 1. Mr. Griffith would succeed John Bryant of Albany, who is now serving as chief assistant under State Treasurer Jefferson Miles.

Mr. Griffith has resided in Salem for many years and is one of the owners of the Jefferson state bank. He has other business holdings in this section.

Mr. Griffith served as an officer during the world war, and is now commander of the state department, American Legion.

Selection of other assistants in the state treasurer's department after January 1 probably will be announced by Mr. Kay within the next two or three weeks.

OTTAWA (AP).—Salmon from the seaboards of America live and grow fat in the waters of Lake Ontario and the streams of British Columbia, according to a bulletin issued by the Canadian department of marine and fisheries announcing success of a six-year experiment. Fully matured sockeyes, native to the Pacific coast, have been taken from Lake Ontario this year and two-year-old Atlantic salmon have been caught in the Pacific coast down the Canadian river of Vancouver Island.
