Local Man Writes of Eastern Oregon Game

(Editor's Note—The following article was written by F. W. Gahler, printed in the Hunter-Trade-Trapper and then reprinted in the Oregon Sportsman.)

Now comes word from old Oregon and a word of praise for Mr. Clyde G. Farley, whose interesting article appeared in the September issue of H-T-T. His stand was taken in defense of the Western Sportsman in regards to unlawful hunting and game laws.

If anyone is of the impression that a westerner can step out and bag a deer or any other fur or feather bearer, out of season or without regard to laws, without being taken into custody before the smoke has fairly cleared away from his gun, he is sadly mistaken and has underestimated the efficiency of our game wardens.

Our game is well protected and the western sportsman is a staunch upholder of the state game laws. Of course there are a few cases where unlawful hunting has been committed, but these illegal poachers are soon run down and always pay the penalty according to law.

Our game commission is very efficient, our laws are stringent and our western judges unwavering by sentiment. If a man is guilty of crime, he receives the limit as provided by state or federal law; so if anyone has the slightest doubt as to the authenticity of these statements and feels lucky, then let him try his hand.

Oregon is a sportsman's paradise. North, South, East and even to the very shores of the great Pacific game is found in great abundance and our scenic beauties are unsurpassed. Our streams are stocked with great quantities of trout of every description.

Bonanza, the largest fish hatchery in the world, situated on the banks of the Columbia river, a short distance from Portland and produces fabulous quantities of fish annually, that the angler may have an ever-increasing supply.

Our wooded hills and valleys provide shelter for countless fur-bearing and feathered folk, protected short open seasons, with the exception of bear, cougar and other destructive marauders on which there is no closed season.

La Grande, where I reside, is situated in the Grande Ronde valley in the heart of the blue mountains. In this particular locality and in the surrounding vicinity, when we are visited by an exceptionally dry season which causes a scarcity of food in the mountains, deer, bear and coyotes have been known to wander down to our very back doors and become quite fearless.

Great flocks of ducks swarm into our valley every fall and remain until the lakes and ponds are frozen; even then a large number of them remain the year round. This affords great sport for the duck enthusiast of which there seems to be a large percentage. Perhaps I am a little biased, but I believe this to be one of the best hunting grounds in the state.

As in every well regulated hunting community, we have our sportsman's club, ours being the King, Pin and Pinfoot club. Our dues and entrance fee combined amount to one dollar, a price that is within the reach of all and I dare say that every sportsman in his community is a member.

We co-operate in every way with the Forestry Service and the State Game Commission, therefore we have no trouble, for everyone does his bit to uphold the constitution of the organization.

We hold three banquets annually. First a fish feed, second a deer and third a clam bake. On such occasions we are honored by members of the Forestry Service and the State Game Commission who talk to us and inform us where the "big ones" are to be caught where the best hunting grounds are and the conditions of trails and roads.

This is co-operation that places the law and the sportsman in friendly relationship, creates harmony which has proven a great help to both.

If you have not already an organization of this type in your community, start one and see how satisfactory it really is. The La Grande Chamber of Commerce will gladly furnish you with the necessary information.

Before I close this article I would like to add a few lines on behalf of Eastern Oregon sportsmen from the game standpoint.

The average outsider regards this section of Oregon as a fruitless waste of barren hills, sage brush and rattlesnakes but not so. In fact a large per cent of this waste land is now under cultivation; owing to the large sums of money expended by this state on irrigation projects which have proven the soil extremely fertile and capable of large crops. Still a larger portion

of Eastern Oregon lies in heavily timbered hills and valleys, which although not as large as the timber found in the lowlands near the coast, supports a profitable lumbering industry on which the livelihood of our immediate community largely depends.

Wallowa Lake, about seventy-five miles from La Grande and accessible from here by an excellent highway, is a first class summer resort situated in the Wallowa mountains, which are noted for their rugged beauty. This section is often termed "The Switzerland of America," which is indeed just a title. From here many hunting and fishing expeditions are taken into the mountains, which cast their majestic reflections on the mirror-like surface of the lake, and in whose lofty peaks the small lakes, Anacost, Ice Lake and many others in which are hundreds of huge trout, seldom molested by the probing angler.

There is game in this wild vicinity that has never been a human being, so remote is this section from the trodden path of man. One imagines that their forefathers must have chosen this secluded spot as a safe refuge against the fearful onslaught of civilization and there they will be safe for many years to come.

I hope that the reader may gain from my description a fair idea of Oregon's wonderful game supply and natural resources and that I have helped to further Mr. Farley's cause; inasmuch that Western Sportsmen are not slaughtering their game in great quantities and out of season.

They are looking the state game laws to the limit and are even ready to bring to justice this lowly violator.

We extend to all a most cordial invitation to visit Oregon and share with us our magnificent scenery and our game, but first of all, provide yourself with a copy of Oregon game laws for our wardens and deputies are ever on the job.
