

GERMANS WILL VOTE SHORTLY

BERLIN (By the Associated Press).—Nine candidates in all were in the record the German republic has established and as the election of Dec. 7 approaches there is much uncertainty as to what the party alignment will be. The party alignment will be decided by the results of the election to direct the affairs of the republic.

Dr. Wilhelm Marx, the present chancellor took over the post Dec. 1, 1923, and managed to keep the peace during trying times in spite of the fact that he did not represent a majority government. His handling of German affairs in the London conference which evolved plans for putting the Dawes project into effect, and his success in getting the German Reichsmark to accept the agreement reached in the London conference were great achievements.

Just after the adoption of the Dawes plan and the successful raising of the loan of \$200,000,000 for the establishment of a German gold bank to stabilize the German currency, permanently domestic politics got so hot that Chancellor Marx was unable to rebuild his cabinet in such a way as to meet with the demands of the various parties at the extreme right and the extreme left. On Oct. 20 he advised the dissolution of the Reichstag and a new election was held to select a Reichstag which may later represent a majority coalition and make it possible to form a coalition cabinet which shall have the support of a coalition of parties in the legislative body.

This election will take place Dec. 7. It is impossible to forecast the result with any definiteness because of the multiplicity of parties and the religious, racial and political currents in Germany which segregate small groups and prevent the development of two or three really outstanding parties such as exist in most parliamentary governments.

It is quite generally predicted, however, that both the extreme right and the extreme left will have strength in the coming election. Communalist leaders and ultra-nationalist leaders of the extreme right both apparently have had ground. World revolution promises held out by Communist leaders have failed to materialize, so often that German workers are losing faith in promised world upheavals as possible cures for Germany's ills.

Many German newspapers believe the coming elections will not make any material difference in the composition of the Reichstag, and predict the republic will again have a coalition government with no stronger backing than had Chancellor Marx. Marx has undoubtedly inspired general confidence. He is a man of great ability and his integrity has never been questioned by his worst enemies. He is much freer from personal ambition than most of his rivals, and being of the Catholic party and a native Rhinlander, he has been successful in dealing with many problems in the Catholic Rhinland.

Dr. Gustav Stresemann, minister for foreign affairs under Chancellor Marx and his predecessor as chancellor for three months, is generally regarded as the most ambitious politician in Germany. As leader of the German People's party he is endeavoring to bring about a combination which will make it possible to effect a coalition of the extreme right parties with enough strength in the center to form a government. His monarchial speeches, made while he was serving as foreign minister in a republic, have provoked violent attacks from all real democrats, who charge he is willing to favor any combination

RESERVOIR ITEM PASSED

EUGENE, Ore.—Construction of a water reservoir, the extension of water supply and the extension of the electric distribution system throughout the city and to surrounding farm communities were provided for in the 1925 budget of the Eugene water board, just published.

The sum of \$50,000 was set aside as the estimated cost of the new reservoir and \$22,000 for new mains, according to the budget. For filter plant enlargement the sum of \$17,500 was provided for and \$20,000 for the distributing systems.

In the electric department \$42,000 was estimated as the cost of plant enlargement, \$50,000 for the proposed extension of the wires and \$24,000 for standby service.

Estimated expenditures in the electric department totaled \$266,673 and in the water department \$150,326.

FORESTRY BOARD MEETS

SALM, Ore.—Adoption of the budget of proposed expenditures for the next two years and consideration of a plan to revise the present forestry law, comprised the program transacted at a special meeting of the state board of forestry here. It was decided that, in revising the existing forestry law, special attention would be given to the reforestation feature.

Members of the forestry board denied that they had gone on record favoring a reduction in the tax on timber, or had discussed any proposal to levy a severance tax.
