# SPORT NEWS

## COAST TITLE IS UNDECIDED

### Question of Eligibility of Stanford Star Halfback to Be Settled.

SAN FRANCISCO (By the Associated Press)—The 20 to 29 game at Berkeley Saturday between California and Stanford has left Stanford with the chief claim to the Pacific coast football title on the face of its record, but the championship award is muddled over a question of eligibility and it could not be learned Sunday which institution will be given the honor.

Stanford went into the game minus the services of Norman Cleveland, a star halfback, whom the Stanford authorities had barred on the ground that he played in a few minutes in a variety game in 1921 and therefore was appearing in his fourth year of competition, instead of his third which is the limit allowed by the conference. Cleveland had played in the previous conference games against Oregon, Idaho and Montana. There was the question of whether these games would be forfeited on this account. Stanford athletic representatives were quoted as expressing willingness to forfeit the games in the interest of strict accord with the rules, but indications are that the decision will be left to the conference as a whole.

California's Chance Good. Stanford and California entered their classic struggle undated. They remain the only unbeaten teams in the conference, but California has two ties against it while Stanford has but one. If

Stanford is declared out of the race, the title automatically will go to California, which has won it for four years past and closes its fifth straight season without a defeat by any team. In the five years California has played four tie games; all the rest were victories.

However, the championship ledger is made to read, the 90,000 fans who saw the Berkeley game probably the greatest throng that ever attended a football game in America—are satisfied with the epic struggle and doubtless would be willing to give both teams the title. The California league was leading, 20 to 6, with about 10 minutes left for play. The Stanford cardinal led loose an air raid that brought them two touchdowns and tied the score a minute or so before the final gun cracked.

Walter Camp, the dean of football experts, and others long intimate with the game, pronounced the fourth quarter, when each side made two touchdowns, unsurpassed for thrills. The contest was fast, with both teams relying largely on the forward pass. There were no serious injuries and remarkably few penalties. It was the thirty-first year of the annual competition between Stanford and California.

In annual games intense with traditional rivalry, Washington defeated Washington State, 14 to 6, at Seattle, and Oregon beat the Oregon Argies, 7 to 3, at Corvallis.

The other conference game was played at Los Angeles, where the fast Idaho team, a strong contender for conference honors for two seasons, was humbled by Southern California, 13 to 6.

With Saturday's games the conference season closed. Members, however, are scheduled to play several non-conference games, some of them Thanksgiving day. California will meet Pennsylvania at Berkeley on New Year's day.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind.—In the future, when municipalities within this county desire to have the complete contract roads out of the market road fund, the court will require the communities to furnish the right of way without cost before considering the petition, according to a ruling by J. M. Schaeffer, county judge.
