Many Oregon Solons After Board Posts

has requested Senator Meier to place them on the game committee. More than 15 of the 20 members of the senate have asked for assignment on the roads and highways committee. Also at least half of the senate members have "put in" for a place on the ways and means committee.

Senator Charles Hall of Coos and Curry counties, Senator J. S. Maguire of Lane and Senator E. V. Miller of Josephine are among the 15 who wish to be on the roads committee. These three senators—Hall, Maguire and Miller—are directors in the Oregon State Motor association and the association is planning a series of measures to be submitted to the legislature. If Senators Hall, Maguire and Miller are on the senate committee they will be able to control the committee and foster, to the exclusion of all other measures, the program which is being prepared by the Oregon State Motor association.

Gasoline Tax to Be Issue

Coming before this committee will be the proposed additional cent per gallon tax suggested by Governor Pierce and several bills of the motor association. These latter include a bill to abolish the speed traps, which have been maintained in such to the detriment of all other measures, the program which is being prepared by the Oregon State Motor association.

There is also the probability of a new highway financing program being submitted. The present state funds for highway construction are almost exhausted and if the state road program is to be carried on, more funds must be found other than the gasoline tax suggested by the governor. Several measures having this object in view are now in preparation.

Changes are rumored. Just why they should be such a demand for places on the game committee has not been made clear. Several of the present members of the state game commission will be out of office in the near future and the personnel of the game commission may have some effect on the personnel of the transportation. There is talk of a plan to lift the official seal of State Game Warden Burghoff. There is also talk of transferring the game commission from the hands of the governor to the state board of control. Whatever the reason may be, an abnormal demand has developed for positions on the senate game committee.

Repeal, by the people, of the state income tax, and the proposed tax program of Governor Pierce, makes the senate committee on assessment and taxation of unusual importance. The governor wants a tax on cigarettes, gasoline and motion picture admissions. There also may be a bill for gross earnings tax on public corporations. In any event, the taxation committee will have its hands full. Either Senator Corbett of Multnomah, or Senator Dennis of Union and Washington, will head this committee, and it is a cinch that both will be on it.

Upton to Get Place. Jay Upton, ex-president of the senate and senator for the district

of Coos, Jefferson, Deschutes, Klamath and Lake counties, will be head of the judiciary committee, according to rumor. Senator Meier was the 16th vote that elected Upton president of the senate in 1923, and now that Meier will be president, Upton probably will receive this most important assignment. For chairman of the revision of laws committee, B. L. Eddy of Douglas will be chairman, if the guesses are right. Senator Eddy also would like to be on the roads and highways committee and on the game committee, for Douglas county leads with game.

On the banking committee Senator Meier has much available material, such as Senator Butler of Hood River and Wagon; Senator Johnson of Polk and Benton; Senator Corbett, Senator Staples and others more or less connected with banking institutions.

Textbook Bill to Appear

Senator Isaac H. Staples of Multnomah is expected to hand on the education committee, an important assignment in the coming session. The free textbook bill will make the reappearance and there also will be a measure to introduce the reading of the Bible in public schools. This latter measure, when it appears, will cause considerable controversy.

Senator Davis of Multnomah and Harney counties is expected to head the irrigation committee, a body which will have much to do in the impending session. There are several projects in the district of Senator Davis. W. W. Banks of Multnomah probably will head the insurance committee.

The transportation of the ways and means committee is fairly well known. It will have Senator Thomas of Clackamas as chairman and Peter Zimmerman, W. H. Strayer and Alex LaPointe will be members, with possibly Henry Taylor and Fred Plake. This is one of the hardest working committees of the session and it has the most thankless job.

50 Men Seek Places

Speaker-to-be Burdick is struggling with his committee and he has 50 men to satisfy. Herbert Gordon of Multnomah probably will head ways and means, and legal draftsman of Washington will have a place on roads and highways in the house. W. C. North is the probable chairman of the assessment and taxation committee and John Corbett presumably will be on judiciary or on revision of laws. Fred Meinel of Clackamas and Multnomah and John B. Corbett are expected to be on the committee on resolutions. R. J. Likewood wants on the game committee. Representative Wheeler, of Lane probably will be on the house ways and means committee, and possibly Representative Buchanan, of Benton, and one of the Umatilla delegation and a member of the Marion delegation.

According to report, Mr. Burdick has not advanced with his committee as far as Senator Meier, for he has today as many men to take care of and more committees to fill. There are a number of voted bills to consider. The senate will refer these voted bills to the committee which handled the bills in the 1923 session, even though the personnel of the 1923 session committee is different, but in the house there probably will be a special committee appointed to deal with voted bills.
