Business Better.—The general commercial and industrial condition in the United States has improved to such a degree that government officials can concentrate attention to constructive development for the future. Secretary Hoover said today, rather than continuously attempting to ease economic life for particular geographic sections or for industries.

With the farming situation well cleared up by better prices, pressure for giving relief is much less," Hoover stated.

as accomplished by the ZR-3.

"The future? It is filled with important possibilities. I say that I am not a dreamer but I say that we probably will begin at once to build an Akron airship of 5000 cubic feet capacity, which will fly from Spain to South America, thus crossing the Atlantic at its widest reach."

Ocean Service Seems Assured.

"Regular trans-Atlantic air service between America and Europe seems assured. We do not venture to say how large dirigibles may be built."

Dr. Arnstein considers the trans-continental demonstration flight of the Shenandoah "very important and very interesting, chiefly because it demonstrated the practicability of the American mooring mast and the American condenser for preserving ballast."

He thinks the flight all the more remarkable because there apparently was no attempt to dodge unfavorable weather.

He was convinced that the future of the dirigible rested largely upon enlarged sources of helium supply and upon cheaper methods of production.

"Dirigibles for war?" Dr. Arnstein repeated the question of interviewers. He smiled "really," he said, "we are trying to forget that we made Zeppelins for war purposes. Don't you think that we of them ought to be forgotten? We are thinking now only of the dirigible as a vehicle of peace, a means of commercial travel."

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POLICE FIND BLOOD STAINS, FINGERPRINTS

er evidence he has in his possession, that Mrs. Shenandoah was murdered and that her body was cast into the furnace in an effort to hide all trace of the crime.

The only other possible theory which Prosecutor King has in mind is that she might have committed suicide and her body placed in the furnace by some person who did not want it to become known that she had taken her life, he said Monday night.

Other discoveries, turned by the prosecutor as "important," included the finding by David Shadrack, Bexley marshall, of an upturned fruit jar lid, containing about half an ounce of red fluid, which chemist C. F. Long said closely resembles human blood. Bits of tissue, which might have been scraped from the body of a man, were found on a step of the collar stairway.

Fingerprints Red.

Red fingerprints were found on the door of the clothes chute in the basement by Detective Harry Carson.

The supposed blood and blood-stains will be analyzed by Chemist Long, to determine whether they are from a human being, it was announced. He said his report might be made in 48 hours.

The bottle of poison which was missing from the medicine cabinet in the Shenandoah home last Monday night, according to authorities, was found in the medicine cabinet Monday. According to Mr. King, the Rev. C. V. Shattley, husband of the victim, told him it was missing.
