**UNION, Ore. Mrs. Wigginsworth, widow of the murdered man, and his three children, Frank, of the Park up Catherine creek, Mrs. James Devere of Blythe, and Mrs. Myra Gatchell of Hatfield, Washington, and their families were here to attend the funeral services. With the exception of Mrs. Wigginsworth, who will remain in Union for several weeks at least, the members of the family returned to their homes after the funeral.
