The Corbett Vote

Good Aeration Needed In Fermenting Cider

In making vinegar, care is taken to aerate the fermenting cider well, says E. H. Wiegand, horticulturist for the Oregon experiment station. This is necessary to get a proper strength vinegar. Barrels in which the fermentation is taking place are firmly supported on the sides with hoops drilled above the vinegar level at each end of the barrel. This allows free circulation of air. After fermentation has started, the barrel is not disturbed. Unsuccessful vinegar making is usually due to filling the barrels too full, preventing free circulation of air. Low, acetic acid content of vinegar is usually due to low sugar content. Sugar completely fermented will yield a high test vinegar.

Pectin for Fruit Jelly Is Made by Housewives

Pectin for future jellymaking is best preserved at this season of the year by Oregon housewives, says E. H. Wiegand, horticulturist for the experiment station. A home supply may be made by taking apple peels or small apples and simmering them for two hours with a slight addition of water. The juice extracted is best preserved in well stoppered bottles. The bottles are sterilized either in hot water at 180 to 190 degrees F. for 30 minutes or by one-tenth of 1 per cent by weight of benzoate of soda. Combined with various fruit juices, this product will make a good grade of jelly. Proportions to use are one part pectin, and three parts of fruit juice to four parts of sugar.
