WASHINGTON (NEA Special).—The "short-haired" woman in politics, so generally predicted during the years of suffrage agitation and campaigning, has not materialized.

At least, she has not materialized as the woman who gets elected to office. She may be more active in agitating for the election of women, she may be the one who keeps things stirred up, but it is the long-haired ladies who are found to be victorious when the votes are counted.

Without exception, no woman elected to high office since woman suffrage was adopted has had short hair. Whether that is just happenstance, or whether this result is due to a clearly defined preference on the part of the voters for women who retained their long locks, no one can say for sure.

Perhaps it is simply another evidence of our conservatism, this choosing for public office of women who hold to the conservative, dignified, old-time culture as against the modernist "progressive" who wear their hair cut short.

Miss Jeanette Rankin, first woman to sit in congress, wore her hair drawn straight back in a rather severe, spindly coiffure. "Aunt Alice," Robertson drew her gray hair into a tight little knot, in the style affected by the grandmothers of the modern movement.

Mrs. Winifred Mason Huck and Mrs. Mae Nolan were less severe in the styles in which they wore their hair, but the point is, they wore it long.

School Budget for District Up for Sanction Friday Afternoon

MEETING WILL PRECEDE VOTING

Slight Increase in the Amount Due to Heavy Registration and Building of Grammar School

The polls for the special school district election will open at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon at the Central school building. At this time the property owners of La Grande will vote upon the school budget for the year 1924.

The school board this year is asking for a total fund of \$108,844.14. This amount is slightly in excess of the six per cent increase in the 1923 budget allowed by law. The increase in the school expenditures has been brought about, so the school board points out, by the addition of the Willow school to the public school system of La Grande and the employment of new teachers caused by the increase in attendance. The necessity for the retirement of a larger amount of principal funds is also given as a reason for the slight

Sacrifice Of The Living Is Explained

Reverend Holl Delivers Masterly Sermon at Union Revival Meeting Last Night.

The union revival service last night, prior to the Thanksgiving service in the Methodist church, was well attended and added one more assurance to the ministerial association and half hundred young men backing the evangelistic program, that the public is securing much benefit from the work of the Protestant churches along this line.

Reverend Wm. F. Holl, pastor of the Lutheran church, was the speaker last night, using as his topic "The Living Service of God" taken from Romans 12:1.

A few of his statements follow: "An unbeliever asked a church member, 'what, after all, do you mean by Divine Services?' and the believer tried to enlighten him. 'Before I go to church, I pray for a receptive heart, and when I enter the building my prayer is in part answered. The members bow their heads in prayer as the organ plays softly and then I faintly hear the song of the processionalists as they sing below. Their song grows louder as they march up and the organ music swells in unison with their steps. Suddenly the church doors open and a burst of music greets the worshippers who respectively rise as the procession winds its way to the altar.'

"But both of us were wrong," declared Reverend Holl. "That was public worship and not the living service to God. Public worship shows the life of the justified in respect to their souls but there also is a Divine life of the justified in respect to his bodily return. And the real liturgy of the New Testament is a combination of the two."

Anti-Saloon League of America Asks Passage of Crampton One-Bureau Bill.

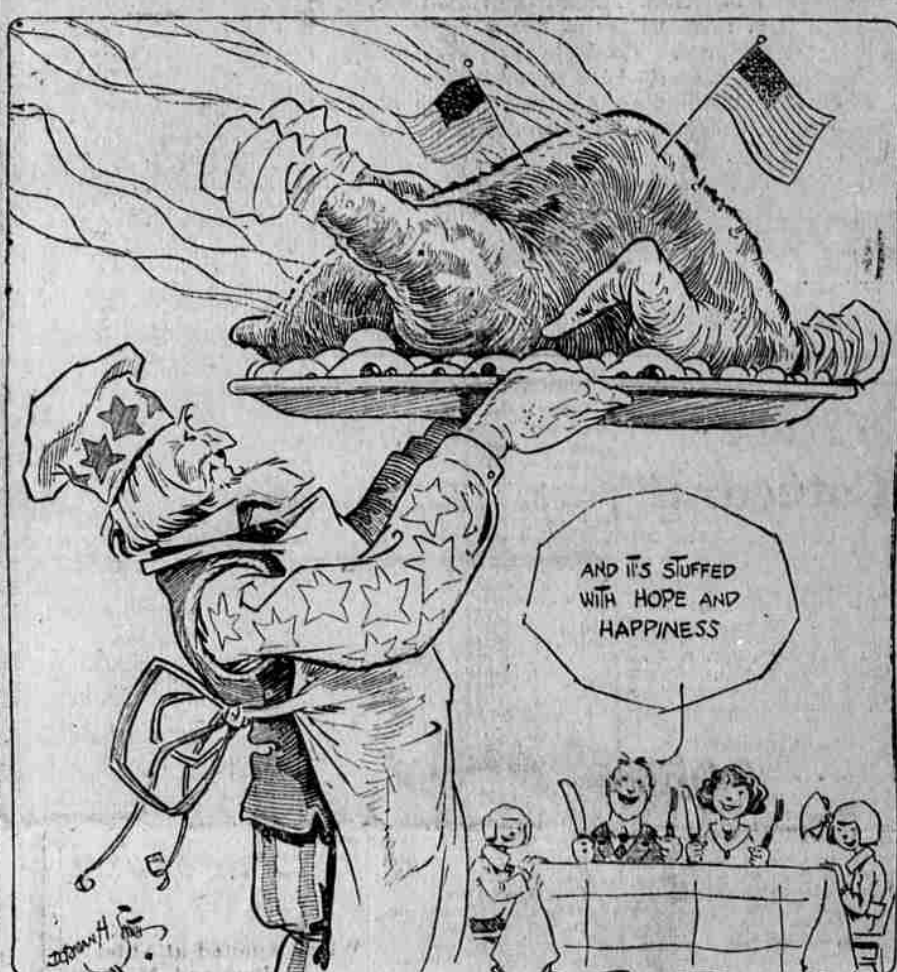

(By the Associated Press).—A resolution declaring the law enforcement situation demands serious consideration of all three branches of government, was presented to President Calvin Coolidge and Attorney General Stone today by the executive committee of the Anti-Saloon League of America.

The resolution asked for the passage of a bill introduced last session by Representative Crampton, of Michigan, providing for uniting law enforcement work into one bureau, and placing federal prohibition agents under the civil service law.

Seal Sale to Help In Fighting T-B to Begin

The La Grande Christmas Seal sale will be conducted under the direction of Mrs. E. Rosenbaum, who announced that the sale will begin officially after Thanksgiving day and continue until the arrival of Christmas day.

"The principal drive will be made early in December," she states, "so that people will have an opportunity to use the seals on their Christmas mail."

The Oregon Tuberculosis association, which has supervision of the seal sale in Oregon, has reported to Mrs. Rosenbaum that the progress made in the anti-tuberculosis campaign financed by the sale of these seals is so marked that if the present rate of progress can continue for 50 years, the disease will be practically abolished. The death rate from tuberculosis in the United States is less than one-half of what it was 15 years ago.

CONGRESS' SESSION IS TO BE BUSY

House Faces Plenty of Work During Coming Three Months

SUPPLY BILLS TO BE FIRST TASK

Committees on Shipping Board and Aircraft to Make Report Following Summer's Probe.

WASHINGTON. (By the Associated Press).—In the three brief months of life that remain for the Sixty-eighth congress, the House has many matters that must be thrashed out if it is to retire next March with a clean legislative calendar.

Hanging over the session that ended last June are many bills that must be taken up on the floor for consideration after congress reconvenes next Monday. Coupled with these are other bills, practically completed in committee, but not reported. In the closing months of the session numerous investigations were ordered. Many of these gained momentum during the summer recess, and the report of their work must be reported in to the House legislative program.

Business Confidence In Distinct Revival

Throughout the last three years an immediate wave of inflation has been repeatedly forecast, states the current issue of the "Guaranty Survey," which has just been issued by the Guaranty Trust company of New York. The failure of events to justify these predictions heretofore provides, of course, the periodical points out—no positive assurance that out of the new combination of factors an unusual credit situation may not ultimately arise.

"For some years past, the 'Survey' continues, 'the lending power of the banks in conjunction with a continuing inflow of gold from abroad has made possible an extraordinary degree of inflation which might have been realized if other conditions had been equally conducive to such a result.
