CONGRESS' SESSION IS TO BE BUSY

and passed. Some of these supply bills already are ready for consideration. And to this stack of business, hanging in various places on the calendar, it is added, may be added other problems as yet unforeseen.

Supply Bills First
The supply bills, making available the money to carry on the government's machinery for the next fiscal year, probably will be acted upon first. After these have been cleared from the pathway, it is anticipated that a number of matters the House will turn to.

Standing at the top of all business remaining from the last session is the Howell-Barkley bill to abolish the Railroad Labor board. Special committees appointed to investigate respectively the Shipping Board and the manufacture and operation of the aircraft industry have been at work during the summer. Both committees, it is said, will submit reports on the work accomplished to date, and press forward during the session to the completion of their assignments.

Land Grant Problem.
The inquiry into land grants to the Northern Pacific Railway company presents another problem for attention. This work was held up during the summer recess of lack of funds.

The House also expects to receive a report from a committee headed by Representative McFadden, of Pennsylvania, chairman of the Banking and Currency Committee, which has been investigating charges of alleged disbursement in government bonds. A committee headed by Representative Snyder, Republican, New York, is expected to submit its findings on an inquiry into the administration of Indian affairs in Oklahoma. Another report is looked for from a committee in charge of Representative Hudson, Republican, Michigan, which has been looking into the enforcement of the liquor traffic laws.

A subcommittee of the Judiciary committee has been busy investigating charges of alleged misconduct in office by Federal Judge William E. Baker of the northern Wisconsin district, while a report also is looked for from the Veterans' committee, members of which have been making a survey of soldiers' home and government hospitals. Chairman Johnson of the committee has been in charge of the work.

The special committee headed by Representative Burton, Republican, Ohio, to investigate charges of misbehavior against Representatives Zolman, and Lister of Kentucky, both Republicans, has completed its work. Of these two members both of whom have been rejected, Mr. Zolman was found innocent of the charges and Mr. Lister has been convicted in the Kentucky courts.

Among the bills considered in committee last session, but not reported, is the Johnson-Swing Boulder Canyon bill. This measure, which was taken up by the Irrigation committee, is expected to be discussed in executive session before being voted upon.

Should it be reported, it also will claim a position on the legislative calendar.

Besides this work the House also may receive from the Senate many more matters to claim attention.

EMPLOYEES TO GET HOLIDAY

The dreaded time of year for the postal employees is approaching. Referring, of course, to the holiday season when great quantities of mail, packages and other paraphernalia pour into the office that must be distributed as nearly as possible on time.

Announcement was made by Ralph Huron, postmaster, yesterday to the effect that the window for the distribution of mail will be kept open Christmas morning until 10:30. Mail will not be distributed to the boxes or by carrier after that hour in order to give the postal employees a chance to take a vacation also. Special arrangements have been made for the delivery of insured mail. Under the regular restrictions, the carriers are required to obtain a signed receipt from the person to whom the packages are consigned and if unable to do so the packages are returned to the office. During the Christmas season, packages returned will be delayed until after the holidays. To eliminate such cases, Mr. Huron has provided a chance for the persons on the various mail routes to have the packages left at the house without the customary signing procedure. This may be arranged by signing an agreement releasing the carrier from responsibility after the package has been delivered at the home.

SACRIFICE OF THE LIVING IS EXPLAINED

tion of both the soul and the body to the Divine Service of God. "That is why Paul beseeches us to present our bodies as a living sacrifice, which is our reasonable service," the speaker said.

The Living Sacrifice.
Some people think that sacrifice is a thing of the past and, specially, since Christ's body was sacrificed, no more bodies, whether of beasts or of men, need die. "A dead body or even a sick one was an abomination to God," Reverend Hall said, "and is yet God ever did accept the dead body as an offering, no more even the dead body of Christ Himself."

"But you say sacrifice means the negation of the life of the victim. So it did, and so it does today. The victims, you and I, the dead man sin, must die so that the new life implanted in us can and must live as never before. And since the victim lives after dying, as Christ did and lives, the sacrifice is not over. It is a continuous one—the body is always dying."

Why do people think their bodies are insignificant and only wish for the day to throw them off? Rev. Hall interrogated.

"Are our bodies only contemptible? If they are, then they must be separated from the living God, Jesus Christ, and left to their spiritual fate. The body also becomes a holy vessel for Christ."

Klamath Budget Approved.
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore.—In the annual school budget election here Klamath taxpayers by almost unanimous vote approved the budget allowance of \$112,590 for the ensuing year.

Governor Issues Requisition.
SALEM, Ore.—Governor Pierce issued requisition papers asking the return to Oregon of E. J. Fitzhugh, who is under arrest in Colorado charged with larceny in Washington county. An officer left here for Colorado to return the prisoner to Oregon.

FRUIT SHIPMENT FAILURE.
SALEM—Loganberry growers, since in 1922 sent two carloads of frozen berries to Chicago and other eastern markets, received only 22 cents a pound for their products, according to the final settlement announced. Thirty-eight growers were parties to the pool.

Besides the actual loss to the growers, H. H. Haynes of the Haynes-Potter Baking company of Portland stands to lose heavily. He furnished the cans in which the berries were shipped at an expense of \$1054.40. The Capital City Ice company of Salem, which froze the berries, has a claim against the pool for \$287.00.

GOVERNOR IS BIT GLOOMY.
MARSHFIELD, Ore.—Governor Pierce, who lectured here in four places Sunday, is anxious for the legislature to pass a 1-cent additional gasoline tax bill in January, and said that if the legislature would do so the Roosevelt highway would be finished before he leaves office in two years.

Hart started to visit a friend in the upper Youngs River, 10 miles or more from the resort city. He cut across some old logging roads and evidently lost his way. When he had failed to return his wife and friends became alarmed. Searching parties were sent out and after a long search he was found. "I walked up and down and then down till I got cold," he said, adding that he had some fainting spells on the way. He was apparently very tired when he was found.

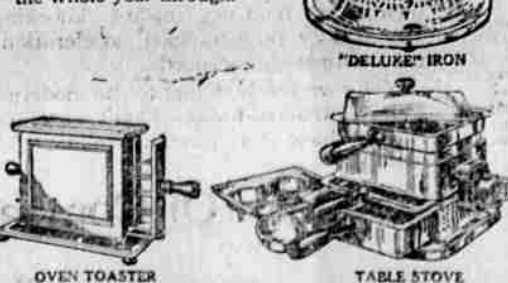
